CR540 Use of Force in Defense of Property.

<u>A defendant is justified in using force, other than deadly force, against another person to defend real or personal property when and to the extent [he][she] reasonably believes the force is necessary to prevent or terminate the other person's criminal interference with real or personal property.</u>

The property must have been:

- lawfully in the defendant's possession; or
- lawfully in the possession of a member of the defendant's immediate family; or
- belonging to a person whose property the defendant has a legal duty to protect.

In determining reasonableness, you must consider:

- the apparent or perceived extent of the damage to the property;
- property damage previously caused by the other person;
- threats of personal injury or damage to property that have been made previously by the other person;
- any patterns of abuse or violence between the defendant and the other person; and
- any other relevant factor.
