Rule 15-706. Test accommodations.

1	(a) Disabilities and impairments. An Applicant who has mental, physical, or cognitive
2	disabilities as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act ("ADA") may request test
3	accommodations. The request, including all supporting medical documentation, shall be made in
4	writing at the time of application in the format prescribed by the Bar. The decision on such
5	requests shall be made by the LPP Admissions Committee. Test accommodation requests
6	received after the application filing deadline shall not be considered until the review period prior
7	to the immediately following examination. An Applicant requesting test accommodations who
8	withdraws within 60 days prior to the examination date may be charged a fee equivalent to any
9	nonrefundable expenses the Bar has incurred responding to the accommodation request. The
10	Applicant must demonstrate that:
11	(a)(1) she or he is disabled as defined by the ADA; and
12	(a)(2) the disability impacts her or his ability to take the Paralegal Practitioner
13	Examination(s); and
14	(a)(3) the accommodation requested is necessary to meet the limitation caused by the
15	disability.
16	(b) English as a second language. English as a second language is not a cognitive disability
17	or impairment.
18	(c) Review. An Applicant may request a review of the decision. The review will be
19	conducted in accordance with Rule15-715.
20	(c)(1) The review will only reexamine the documentation the Applicant submitted at the time
21	she or he requested accommodation, the written opinion of the Committee's psychologist, the
22	written recommendation of the LPP Admissions Committee and the Bar's written decision.
23	(c)(2) Any attempt to change the original accommodations request or submit new medical
24	documentation will be considered a new request for accommodation. The new request must be
25	resubmitted to the LPP Admissions Committee for review and is subject to the deadlines set
26	forth in Rule 15-706(a).

Effective November 1, 2018
