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- 1 Rule 14-409. Self-study categories of Accredited Categories of Elective CLE defined.
- 2 (a) Lecturing, teaching, panel discussions and community outreach.

(1) Lecturing in an Accredited CLE Program. Lawyers or paralegal practitioners
who lecture in an Accredited CLE program will receive Self-Study credit for three
hours of Elective CLE for each hour spent lecturing, including participating as a
presenter in a panel discussion. No lecturing or teaching credit is available for
preparation time.

8 (2) <u>Community outreach.</u>

9 (A) Lawyers or paralegal practitioners who lecture in a community outreach
10 capacity may receive Self-Study-Elective CLE credit for each hour spent lecturing
11 to groups of 5 or more non-lawyers and non-paralegal practitioners for the
12 purpose of educating a non-lawyer and non-paralegal practitioner audience
13 about legal topics.

(B) Community outreach may include, but is not limited to, a lecture made by a 14 lawyer or paralegal practitioner about the lawyer's or paralegal practitioner's 15 deliberation on legal subject matter as an elected or appointed member of a 16 public policy making body that is created by statute or constitution and a lecture 17 by a lawyer or a paralegal practitioner about the structure of Government, the 18 19 Utah Constitution, the U.S. Constitution or any legislation of either the Utah 20 Legislature or U.S. Congress. Such community outreach lecturing, however, 21 must be referenced in an agenda or outline format identifying: the body to whom the lecture is presented; the date, hour, and duration of the lecture; and the topics 22 23 covered.

(C) Community outreach lecturing on legal subjects by a lawyer is eligible for a
 maximum of four hours of Accredited Self-Study-Elective CLE credit for a
 Compliance Cycle. Community outreach lecturing on legal subjects by a

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paralegal practitioner is eligible for a maximum of two hours of Accredited Self Study Elective CLE credit for a Compliance Cycle.

29 (b) **Final published brochure, outline, or agenda.** The Board will determine the

- 30 number of <u>Self-Study Elective</u> CLE hours available for a program based on the final
- 31 published brochure, outline, or agenda, as appropriate.
- 32 (c) Equivalent CLE credit for certain <u>Self-Study Elective</u> CLE.
- (1) Subject to the Board's determination, the Board may allow equivalent credit for
 such CLE that furthers the purpose of this article and qualifies for equivalency.

35 (2) Such equivalent CLE may include, but is not limited to, viewing Accredited CLE

36 audio and video and webcast presentations<u>– or</u> computer interactive telephonic

37 programs, writing and publishing an article in a legal periodical, part-time teaching

- by a lawyer or paralegal practitioner in an approved law school, or delivering a
- 39 paper or speech on a professional subject at a meeting primarily attended by

40 lawyers, paralegal practitioners, legal assistants, or law students.

41 (3) The number of hours of credit allowed for such activities and the procedures for
42 obtaining equivalent credit will be determined specifically by the Board for each
43 instance.

44 (d) Pro Bono Legal Services. Elective CLE credit for Pro Bono Legal Services is
45 addressed in Rule 14-419.
