- 2 *Effective*: 11/1/2023
- 3 (a) A recommendation of a court commissioner is the order of the court until modified
- 4 by the court. A party may file a written objection to the recommendation within 14 days
- 5 after the recommendation is made in open court or, if the court commissioner takes the
- 6 matter under advisement, within 14 days after the minute entry of the recommendation
- 7 is served. A judge's counter-signature on the commissioner's recommendation does not
- 8 affect the review of an objection.
- 9 (b) The objection must identify succinctly and with particularity the findings of fact, the
- 10 conclusions of law, or the part of the recommendation to which the objection is made and
- state the relief sought. The memorandum in support of the objection must explain

- 25 the right, upon request, to present testimony and other evidence on genuine issues of

27	(d)(3) If the hearing before the commissioner was in a domestic relations matter other
28	than a cohabitant abuse protective order, any party has the right, upon request:
29	(d)(3)(A) to present testimony and other evidence on genuine issues of material
30	fact relevant to custody; and
31	(d)(3)(B) to a hearing at which the judge may require testimony or proffers of
