## Children – Other court proceedings

(Utah Rule of Civil Procedure 100; Utah Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act, UCCJEA, Utah Code 81-11-101 et seq.; Utah Uniform Interstate Family support Act, UIFSA, Utah Code 81-8-102 et seq.)

I say the following:

5. There are no custody, child support, or parent-time cases about **Kylia Chantel Johnson** and **Blake Michael Carter**'s minor children in any court or government agency. This includes filed, pending, and completed cases.

6. **Kylia Chantel Johnson** and **Blake Michael Carter** have physical custody of our child(ren), and are the only people who have custody, child support, and parent-time rights to our child(ren).

## PARENTING PLAN

This Parenting Plan is being filed in good faith.

This parenting plan is agreed to by **Kylia Chantel Johnson** and **Blake Michael Carter**.

### Children - custody

(Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 9, Part 3)

7. It is in the children's best interest that the parties be awarded Joint Legal Custody and that **Kylia Chantel Johnson** be awarded Sole Physical custody. **Blake Michael**

**Carter** should have parent-time at reasonable times and places. **Kylia Chantel Johnson** is filing this Parenting Plan and verifies the plan is filed in good faith.

The parents will follow a custom parent-time schedule.

- a. **Kylia Johnson and Blake Carter will continue week on and week off schedule until Nyx Carter starts school. When Nyx Carter starts school she will remain with Kylia Johnson and go with Blake Carter every other weekend.**

**FOR CHILDREN UNDER 5 MONTHS OF AGE (Utah Code 81-9-304):**

**Weekly:** Three two-hour visits every week in the home of the custodial parent, an established child-care setting, or other environment familiar to the child, unless the parents agree otherwise.

**Holidays:** Two hours on each of the noncustodial parent's holidays indicated below in the Special Occasion table in the home of the custodial parent, an established child-care setting, or other environment familiar to the child, unless the parents agree otherwise.

**FOR CHILDREN 5 MONTHS TO UNDER 9 MONTHS OF AGE:**

**Weekly:** Three three-hour visits every week in the home of the custodial parent, an established child-care setting, or other environment familiar to the child, unless the parents agree otherwise.

**Holidays:** Two hours on each of the noncustodial parent's holidays indicated below in the Special Occasion table in the home of the custodial parent, an established child-care setting, or other environment familiar to the child, unless the parents agree otherwise.

**FOR CHILDREN 9 MONTHS TO UNDER 12 MONTHS OF AGE:**

**Weekly:** One 8 hour visit every week and one 3 hour visit every week.

**Holidays:** Eight hours on each of the noncustodial parent's holidays indicated below in the Special Occasion table, and

**Electronic Communication:** Brief telephone contact and/or virtual parent-time at least two times a week, at reasonable hours and for reasonable duration. Virtual parent time may be exercised if the equipment is reasonably available and the parents reside at least 100 miles apart, provided that if the parties cannot agree on whether the equipment is reasonably available, the court shall decide whether the equipment for virtual parent-time is reasonably available, taking into consideration the best interest of the child, each parent's ability to handle any additional expenses for virtual parent-time; and any other factors the court considers material.

**FOR CHILDREN 18 MONTHS TO UNDER 3 YEARS OF AGE:**

**Midweek:** One weekday evening from 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. to be specified by the noncustodial parent. However, if the child is being cared for during the day outside the child's regular place of residence, the noncustodial parent may, with advance notice to the custodial parent, pick up the child from the caregiver at an earlier time and return the



child to the custodial parent by 8:30 p.m.

**Alternate Weekends:** Alternative weekends beginning on the first weekend after the entry of the decree from 6:00 p.m. Friday until 7:00 p.m. Sunday.

**Holiday Parent-time:** Holidays as specified below in the Special Occasion table.

**Extended Parent-time:** Two one-week periods, separated by at least four weeks, at the option of the noncustodial parent;

- a. one week shall be uninterrupted time for the parent granted the extended parent-time;
- b. the remaining week shall be subject to weekday parent-time for the custodial parent on the same day as the parent exercising the extended parent-time has during the other weeks of the year; and
- c. the custodial parent shall have an identical one-week period of uninterrupted time for vacation.

Notification of extended parent-time or vacation weeks with the child shall be provided at least 30 days in advance to the custodial parent.

**Electronic Communication:** Brief telephone contact and/or virtual parent-time at least two times a week, at reasonable hours and for reasonable duration. Virtual parent time may be exercised if the equipment is reasonably available and the parents reside at least 100 miles apart, provided that if the parties cannot agree on whether the equipment is reasonably available, the court shall decide whether the equipment for virtual parent-time is reasonably available, taking into consideration the best interest of the child, each parent's ability to handle any additional expenses for virtual parent-time; and any other factors the court considers material.

### **FOR CHILDREN 3 YEARS TO UNDER 5 YEARS OF AGE (81-9-304):**

**Midweek:** One weekday evening from 5:30 - 8:30 p.m. to be specified by the noncustodial parent. However, if the child is being cared for during the day outside the child's regular place of residence, the noncustodial parent may, with advance notice to the custodial parent, pick up the child from the caregiver at an earlier time and return the child to the custodial parent by 8:30 p.m.

**Alternate Weekends:** Alternative weekends beginning on the first weekend after the entry of the decree from 6:00 p.m. on Friday until 7:00 p.m. on Sunday continuing.

**Holiday Parent-time:** Holidays as specified below in the Special Occasion table.

**Extended Parent-time:** Two two-week periods, separated by at least four weeks, at the option of the noncustodial parent;

- a. one two-week period shall be uninterrupted time for the parent granted the extended parent time;
- b. the remaining two-week period shall be subject to an equal amount of weekday parent-time that the parent exercising the extended parent-time has during the other weeks of the year; and
- c. the custodial parent shall have an identical two-week period of uninterrupted time for vacation.

A parent shall notify the custodial parent at least 30 days in advance of extended parent-time or vacation weeks.

**Electronic Communication:** Brief telephone contact and/or virtual parent-time at least two times a week, at reasonable hours and for reasonable duration. Virtual parent time may be exercised if the equipment is reasonably available and the parents reside at least 100 miles apart, provided that if the parties cannot agree on whether the equipment is reasonably available, the court shall decide whether the equipment for virtual parent-time is reasonably available, taking into consideration the best interest of the child, each parent's ability to handle any additional expenses for virtual parent-time; and any other factors the court considers material.

### Parent-time for special occasions

8. The parents will follow the schedule for special occasions below. If there is more than one child and the children's school schedules vary for purpose of a holiday, at the option of the parent exercising the holiday or the parent's half of the holiday, the children may remain together for the holiday period beginning the first evening that all children's schools are let out for the holiday and ending the evening before any child returns to school. (Utah Code 81-9-302, 303).

### Parent-time transfers

9. Pick-up and drop-off ("transfers") of the children for parent-time will be as described below:

The parties will make arrangements for pick up, delivery and return of the children prior to each scheduled parent-time.

### Curbside transfers

10. There will not be curbside transfers. The parent/person dropping-off or picking-up a child may accompany the children to the other parent/person when parent-time transfers are made.

### Decision-making

11. Each parent will make day-to-day decisions for the children during the time they are caring for the children. Either parent may make emergency decisions affecting the health or safety of the children. A parent who makes an emergency decision must share the decision with the other parent as soon as reasonably possible.

**Joint decision-making.** The parents will share responsibility for making major decisions about the children. If there is a disagreement, the parents will resolve the dispute as provided in the Resolving disputes section below.

### Education plan

12. The school the children will attend is based on **Kylia Chantel Johnson's** home residence.

13. Kylia Chantel Johnson and Blake Michael Carter has authority to check the children out of school. Kylia Chantel Johnson and Blake Michael Carter has access to the children during school. If the parents cannot agree, education decisions will be made by Kylia Chantel Johnson.

### Communication with each other

14. Parents will communicate with each other by any method.

### Communication with the children

15. The parents agree they will:

- provide age-appropriate help to the children to communicate with the other parent.
- give the children privacy during their communication with the other parent. The parents will not interfere with or monitor communication between the children and the other parent.

16. Parents and children may communicate with each other whenever the children choose.

- By any method

### Records and information sharing

17. Both parents will have access to records and the ability to consult with providers regarding education, child care, and health care.

### Travel by the children

18. During their parent-time, the parent may consent for the children to travel with a sports team, religious group, school group, relatives, friends, by themselves, or with



others.

19. If the children will be travelling for more than **3** days, the parent arranging the travel will notify the other parent at least **14** days in advance. That parent will give the other parent the travel schedule, locations and phone numbers at least **1** days in advance. In case of emergency, the parent will provide as much notice as possible.

20. Other agreements about travel by the children: **If one parent is planning on international traveling, they must give the other parent notice 30 days in advance.**

### Child care

21. A child care provider for our children must be:

A relative, friend, or neighbor.

Over the age of **18**.

Other qualifications: **CPR certification Driver's license**

### Relocation of a parent

22. Neither parent may relocate with the minor children more than **150** miles from their current residence without a written agreement signed by the parties or further court order.

23. If either parent lives more than 149 miles away from the other or the parents live in separate countries, costs for the children's travel expenses for parent-time will be shared equally.

24. If a parent has been found in contempt for not being current on all support obligations, and they do not have primary physical care of the child, they will be responsible for the child's related travel expenses.

25. Reimbursement for the child's travel expenses must be made within 30 days of receipt of documents detailing those expenses.

### Resolving disputes

26. If the parents need to resolve a dispute regarding the children, they will discuss the issues in good faith and try to reach an agreement based on what is best for their children. If the parents are unable to agree, they will go to the following before bringing the issue to the court:

a. **Mediation**

### Changing the plan

This plan remains in effect until changed. A change comes from a modification of a court order.

## END OF PARENTING PLAN

Income: Petitioner (Kylia Chantel Johnson) (Utah Code 81-6-203)

27. **Kylia Chantel Johnson's** gross monthly income for child support purposes is **\$2500**. **Kylia Chantel Johnson** base child support amount using the **sole** custody calculation is **\$313**. **Kylia Chantel Johnson** receives the following gross monthly income:

- a. **Kylia Chantel Johnson** is employed at **Scooters Coffee** and grosses **\$1029** per month. **Kylia Chantel Johnson** is voluntarily underemployed and is capable of working at a job which pays more. Based upon **Kylia Chantel Johnson's** work experience, gross monthly income should be attributed to **Kylia Chantel Johnson** in the amount of **\$2500** per month. (Utah Code 81-6-203)

Income: Respondent (Blake Michael Carter) (Utah Code 81-6-203)

28. **Blake Michael Carter's** gross monthly income for child support purposes is **\$3467**. **Blake Michael Carter** receives the following gross monthly income:

- a. **Blake Michael Carter** is employed at **Dandy Labs**. **Blake Michael Carter** earns **\$3467** gross (pre-tax) monthly income working a 40-hour a week job or less.

29. The adjusted gross monthly income for **Blake Michael Carter** is **\$3467**.

Child support (Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 6, Parts 1 and 2)

30. It is in the best interest of the children that **Blake Michael Carter** be ordered to pay child support to **Kylia Chantel Johnson** as follows:

- a. **\$432.00** per month base support. This amount complies with the Utah Child Support Act.

31. Once a child is no longer eligible to receive child support, the support amount for the eligible children should be recalculated using the child support worksheet (Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 6, Parts 1 and 2). The parties may not divide the base child support award by the number of children and subtract that amount from the prior child support amount.

32. The **sole** custody worksheet was used to calculate child support.

**Kylia Chantel Johnson's** base child support amount is **\$313** per month.

**Blake Michael Carter's** base child support amount is **\$433** per month.

If physical custody of a child changes from what the court orders:

- The parent owing support must pay the support amount to whomever has physical custody of the child.
- The parent must pay the support amount without asking the court to modify the child support order.
- This does not apply to temporary parent-time changes. (Utah Code 81-6-104(4) and 81-6-205(8)(a)).

#### **Child support reduction for extended parent-time**

33. If a child lives with the non-custodial parent by court order or written agreement of the parties for:

- 25 of any 30 consecutive days, base child support will be reduced by 50% for each child



who lives with the non-custodial parent during that time. (Utah Code 81-6-211(1)(a)).

- 12 of any 30 consecutive days, base child support will be reduced by 25% for each child who lives with the non-custodial parent during that time. (Utah Code 81-6-211(1)(b)).

The custodial parent's normal parent-time and holiday parent-time do not count as an interruption of the consecutive day requirement.

34. If a child receives cash assistance through the T.A.N.F. or F.E.P. programs, any agreement by the parties to reduce child support during extended parent-time must be approved by the Office of Recovery Services.

35. Child support will be paid as follows:

**Blake will venmo Kyla**

36. The issue of past-due child support may be decided by future court or administrative action.

37. **Kyla Chantel Johnson** and **Blake Michael Carter** will each pay half of any ORS fee.

- a. If a fee is withheld from payments to **Kyla Chantel Johnson, Blake Michael Carter** will reimburse **Kyla Chantel Johnson** for half the fee.

38. The parties must notify each other within 30 days of any change in their income.

39. The parties can ask to change this child support order by motion after three years from the date of its entry if:

- there is a difference of 10% or more between the amount previously ordered and the new amount of child support under the Utah child support guidelines,
- the difference is not temporary, and
- the amount previously ordered was not a deviation from the child support guidelines.

If the children receive TANF funds at the time an adjustment is sought, ORS will review the order and ask the court to adjust the amount if appropriate. (Utah Code 62A-11-306.2).

40. The parties can ask to change this child support order at any time by petition if there has been a substantial change in circumstances because of material changes in:

- custody;
- the relative wealth or assets of the parties;
- income of a parent of 30% or more;
- the employment potential and ability of a parent to earn;
- the medical needs of the child; or
- the legal responsibilities of either parent for the support of others.

(Utah Code 81-6-202 and 81-6-212)

The change must result in a difference of 15% or more between the amount previously ordered and the new amount of child support under the Utah child support guidelines.

The difference may not be temporary.

The court can consider natural or adoptive children born after the entry of the decree other than those in common to both parties as part of a request to modify an existing award subject to limitations in the law. (Utah Code 81-6-202(8))



41. The Office of Recovery Services (<https://ors.utah.gov/>) provides services to individuals who are seeking assistance in the collection or enforcement of child support orders.

### Dependent children for tax purposes

42. The parents may claim the parties' children as dependents/exemptions for tax purposes as follows:

43. **Kylia Chantel Johnson** may claim the parties' children as dependents/exemptions for tax purposes in odd numbered years. **Blake Michael Carter** may claim the parties' children as dependents/exemptions for tax purposes in even numbered years.

### Child health care (Utah Code 81-6-208)

44. The parties must provide health care coverage for the medical expenses of the dependent children. Health care coverage means coverage under which medical services are provided to a dependent child through: fee for service, a health maintenance organization, a preferred provider organization, any other type of private health insurance, or public health care coverage. Utah Code 81-6-101(14),

45. Both parents must maintain medical, hospital, and dental care insurance for the dependent children if it is available at reasonable cost. If medical insurance is not available at reasonable cost then both parents must ensure the children have health care coverage. This may require applying for public health care coverage, such as CHIP or Medicaid.

a. If, at any time, a dependent child is covered by the medical, hospital, or dental insurance plans of both parents, the coverage will be as follows:

- **Blake Michael Carter's** insurance will be primary coverage.
- **Kylia Chantel Johnson's** insurance will be secondary coverage.

b. If a parent remarries and that parent's dependent child is not covered by that parent's health, hospital, or dental insurance plan but is covered by a step-parent's plan, the coverage will be as follows:

- **Blake Michael Carter's** spouse's insurance will be primary coverage.
- **Kylia Chantel Johnson's** spouse's insurance will be secondary coverage.

c. Both parties will equally share the out-of-pocket costs of the insurance premiums.

d. Both parties will equally share all uninsured and unreimbursed medical and dental expenses that are reasonable and necessary. This includes deductibles, co-insurance, and co-payments paid by a party for the dependent children.

e. The party who pays health care expenses must provide the other party written verification of the cost and payment within 30 days.

f. If a party does not follow this order and provide written verification, they may not be able to receive credit for health care expenses or recover the other party's share of the expenses.

- g. On or before January 2 of each year, the party ordered to maintain coverage must provide verification of coverage to the other party, and ORS, if they are involved.
- h. If there is any change in coverage, within 30 days of the change the party ordered to maintain coverage must notify the other party and ORS, if they are involved.

#### Child care expenses (Utah Code 81-6-209)

46. Both parties will equally share all reasonable work, career, or occupational training-related child care expenses.
- a. The party who pays child care expenses must provide the other party written verification of the cost and identity of the child care provider. This must be done when a provider is first hired, and any time the other party asks for the information. The party incurring or paying child care expenses must notify the other party of any change of a child care provider or monthly expense. This must be done within 30 calendar days of the change.
  - b. The party not directly paying for child care must pay their share of child care expenses as soon as they receive verification of the expenses.
  - c. If a party does **not** follow the order and provide written verification, they may not receive credit for work, career, or occupational training-related child care expenses or recover the other party's share of the expenses.

#### Public assistance statement – Office of Recovery Services (ORS) (Utah Code 81-6-106(2)-(3))

47. Neither party has received or is receiving public assistance from the State of Utah.

#### Personal property (Utah Code Title 81, Chapters 1, 4, 6, and 9)

48. All personal property not addressed in the divorce should be divided as the parties have already divided it.

#### Debts

49. The parties are not aware of any debts from the marriage. If any debts exist, each debt will be the responsibility of the party who incurred the debt.

#### Real property

50. The parties do not have any real property that is marital property. The parties do not need a court order about real property.

#### Alimony

51. Neither party will pay alimony.

#### Retirement money

52. The parties do not need a court order about retirement money.



## Duty to sign documents

53. The parties will sign all documents necessary to comply with the divorce decree within 60 days from entry of the decree. If a party fails to sign a document within 60 days, the other party may ask the court to appoint someone to sign the document. (Utah Rule of Civil Procedure 70)
