(Utah Rule of Civil Procedure 100; Utah Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act, UCCJEA, Utah Code 81-11-101 et seq.; Utah Uniform Interstate Family support Act, UIFSA, Utah Code 81-8-102 et seq.)

I say the following:

5. There are no custody, child support, or parent-time cases about **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** and **Justin Fidel Gallegos's** minor children in any court or government agency. This includes filed, pending, and completed cases.
6. **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** and **Justin Fidel Gallegos** have physical custody of our child(ren), and are the only people who have custody, child support, and parent-time rights to our child(ren).

PARENTING PLAN

This Parenting Plan is being filed in good faith.

This parenting plan is agreed to by **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** and **Justin Fidel Gallegos**.

Children - custody

(Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 9, Part 3)

7. It is in the children's best interest that the parties be awarded Joint Legal Custody and that **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** be awarded Sole Physical custody. **Justin Fidel**

Gallegos should have parent-time at reasonable times and places. Kandace Gayle Gallegos is filing this Parenting Plan and verifies the plan is filed in good faith.

The parents will follow a custom parent-time schedule.

a. The children will stay at the home with Kandace. While the children are with Kandace, Kandace agrees that her stepfather David Hall will not be allowed to be with the children alone. This includes him watching the children for any reason. Kandace and Justin will always work to agree on when the children will be visiting with Justin or when Justin will be visiting the children. Justin will not have any limits on the communication with the children or how much time he is spending with them. Each parent shall ensure that parent-time occurs in a safe and appropriate environment and shall not exercise parent-time while under the influence of alcohol, illegal substances, or any condition that impairs their ability to adequately care for the children. If either parent has a reasonable, good-faith belief that the children's safety or well-being may be at risk, that parent may temporarily delay or suspend the exchange, provided that the parent promptly communicates the concern and, if necessary, seeks appropriate court guidance. In the event there is credible evidence of substance abuse or other conduct that may impair a parent's ability to safely care for the children, the parties agree that appropriate safeguards may be pursued, including but not limited to supervised parent-time or other conditions as ordered by the court.

Parent-time for special occasions

8. The parents will follow the schedule for special occasions below. If there is more than one child and the children's school schedules vary for purpose of a holiday, at the option of the parent exercising the holiday or the parent's half of the holiday, the children may remain together for the holiday period beginning the first evening that all children's schools are let out for the holiday and ending the evening before any child returns to school. (Utah Code 81-9-302, 303).

Parent-time transfers

9. Pick-up and drop-off ("transfers") of the children for parent-time will be as described below:

The parties will make arrangements for pick up, delivery and return of the children prior to each scheduled parent-time.

Curbside transfers

10. There will not be curbside transfers. The parent/person dropping-off or picking-up a child may accompany the children to the other parent/person when parent-time transfers are made.

Decision-making

11. Each parent will make day-to-day decisions for the children during the time they are caring for the children. Either parent may make emergency decisions affecting the health or safety of the children. A parent who makes an emergency decision must share the decision with the other parent as soon as reasonably possible.

Joint decision-making. The parents will share responsibility for making major decisions about the children. If there is a disagreement, the parents will resolve the dispute as provided in the Resolving disputes section below.

Education plan

12. The school the children will attend is based on **Kandace Gayle Gallegos's** home residence.

13. Kandace Gayle Gallegos and Justin Fidel Gallegos has authority to check the children out of school. Kandace Gayle Gallegos and Justin Fidel Gallegos has access to the children during school. If the parents cannot agree, education decisions will be made by Kandace Gayle Gallegos.

Communication with each other

14. Parents will communicate with each other by any method.

Communication with the children

15. The parents agree they will:

- provide age-appropriate help to the children to communicate with the other parent.
- give the children privacy during their communication with the other parent. The parents will not interfere with or monitor communication between the children and the other parent.

16. Parents and children may communicate with each other whenever the children choose.

- By any method

Records and information sharing

17. Both parents will have access to records and the ability to consult with providers regarding education, child care, and health care.

Travel by the children

18. During their parent-time, the parent may consent for the children to travel with a sports team, religious group, school group, relatives, friends, by themselves, or with others.

19. If the children will be travelling for more than 3 days, the parent arranging the travel will notify the other parent at least 7 days in advance. That parent will give the other parent the travel schedule, locations and phone numbers at least 7 days in advance. In case of emergency, the parent will provide as much notice as possible.

Child care

20. A child care provider for our children must be:
A relative, friend, or neighbor.
Over the age of 22.

Relocation of a parent (Utah Code 81-9-209)

21. If either parent moves more than 149 miles from the other, the moving parent must give the non-moving parent a written Notice of Relocation. The notice must be sent at least 60 days before the planned move.

a. The written Notice of Relocation must include:

- Information about the move;
- A proposed parent-time schedule; and
- A statement that the parents will not interfere with the other parent's parent-time.

b. If the moving parent does not give the non-moving parent a Notice of Relocation, the moving parent will be in contempt of the court's order.

22. If either parent lives more than 149 miles away from the other, or if the parents live in different countries, parent-time will be as the parties agree. If they are unable to agree, the following will be the minimum parent-time for the noncustodial parent:

Relocation Schedule (Utah Code 81-9-209)

- a. in years ending in odd number, the minor children will spend the following holidays with the noncustodial parent:
 - i. Thanksgiving holiday beginning Wednesday until Sunday; and
 - ii. spring break, if applicable, beginning the last day of school before the holiday until the day before school resumes;
- b. in years ending in an even number, the minor children will spend the following holidays with the noncustodial parent:
 - i. the entire winter school break period; and
 - ii. the fall school break beginning the last day of school before the holiday until the day before school resumes; and
- c. extended parent-time equal to $\frac{1}{2}$ of the summer or off-track time for consecutive weeks. The children will be returned to the custodial home no later than seven days before school begins. This week will be counted when determining the amount of parent-time to be divided between the parents for the summer or off-track period. The parties will mutually agree on this extended time each year. If they are unable to agree, the noncustodial parent will select the dates for the extended time period.
- d. One weekend per month at the option and expense of the noncustodial parent. The noncustodial parent's monthly weekend entitlement is subject to the following restrictions.
 - i. If the noncustodial parent has not designated a specific weekend for parent-time, the noncustodial parent will receive the last weekend of each month unless a holiday assigned to the custodial parent falls on that particular weekend. If a holiday assigned to the custodial parent falls on the last weekend of the month, the noncustodial parent will be entitled to the next to the last weekend of the month.
 - ii. If a noncustodial parent's extended parent-time or parent-time over a holiday extends into or through the first weekend of the next month, that weekend will be considered the noncustodial parent's monthly weekend entitlement for that month.
 - iii. If a child is out of school for teacher development days or snow days after the children begin the school year, or other days not included in the list of holidays in Subsection (5) and those days are contiguous with the noncustodial parent's monthly weekend parent-time, those days will be included in the weekend parent-time.
- e. The custodial parent is entitled to all parent-time not specifically allocated to the noncustodial parent.

23. Other terms about relocating: Kandace Gallegos will move with all three children to the Phoenix, Arizona area in the summer of 2026. Justin Gallegos has agreed to this arrangement. Kandace will set aside travel money that Justin sends to help with travel expenses so Justin can visit the children when needed or wanted. Arrangements for the children traveling to Utah to stay with Justin will be made when the time comes.

24. If either parent lives more than 149 miles away from the other or the parents live in separate countries, costs for the children's travel expenses for parent-time will be paid by

the the parent who moved.

25. If a parent has been found in contempt for not being current on all support obligations, and they do not have primary physical care of the child, they will be responsible for the child's related travel expenses.

26. Reimbursement for the child's travel expenses must be made within 30 days of receipt of documents detailing those expenses.

Resolving disputes

27. If the parents need to resolve a dispute regarding the children, they will discuss the issues in good faith and try to reach an agreement based on what is best for their children. If the parents are unable to agree, they will go to the following before bringing the issue to the court:

a. Counseling

Changing the plan

This plan remains in effect until changed. A change comes from a modification of a court order.

END OF PARENTING PLAN

Income: Petitioner (Kandace Gayle Gallegos) (Utah Code 81-6-203)

28. **Kandace Gayle Gallegos's** gross monthly income for child support purposes is **\$4147**. **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** base child support amount using the sole custody calculation is **\$707**. **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** receives the following gross monthly income:

- a. **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** is employed at **Challenger School Foundation**. **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** earns **\$4147** gross (pre-tax) monthly income working a 40-hour a week job or less.

Income: Respondent (Justin Fidel Gallegos) (Utah Code 81-6-203)

29. **Justin Fidel Gallegos's** gross monthly income for child support purposes is **\$9767**. **Justin Fidel Gallegos** receives the following gross monthly income:

- a. **Justin Fidel Gallegos** is employed at **Wolverine Fuels, LLC**. **Justin Fidel Gallegos** earns **\$9767** gross (pre-tax) monthly income working a 40-hour a week job or less.

30. The adjusted gross monthly income for **Justin Fidel Gallegos** is **\$9767**.

Child support (Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 6, Parts 1 and 2)

31. It is in the best interest of the children that **Justin Fidel Gallegos** be ordered to pay child support to **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** as follows:

- a. **\$1,648.00** per month base support. This amount complies with the Utah Child

Support Act.

32. Once a child is no longer eligible to receive child support, the support amount for the eligible children should be recalculated using the child support worksheet (Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 6, Parts 1 and 2). The parties may not divide the base child support award by the number of children and subtract that amount from the prior child support amount.

33. The sole custody worksheet was used to calculate child support.

Kandace Gayle Gallegos's base child support amount is \$707 per month.

Justin Fidel Gallegos's base child support amount is \$1648 per month.

If physical custody of a child changes from what the court orders:

- The parent owing support must pay the support amount to whomever has physical custody of the child.
- The parent must pay the support amount without asking the court to modify the child support order.
- This does not apply to temporary parent-time changes. (Utah Code 81-6-104(4) and 81-6-205(8)(a)).

Child support reduction for extended parent-time

34. If a child lives with the non-custodial parent by court order or written agreement of the parties for:

- 25 of any 30 consecutive days, base child support will be reduced by 50% for each child who lives with the non-custodial parent during that time. (Utah Code 81-6-211(1)(a)).
- 12 of any 30 consecutive days, base child support will be reduced by 25% for each child who lives with the non-custodial parent during that time. (Utah Code 81-6-211(1)(b)).

The custodial parent's normal parent-time and holiday parent-time do not count as an interruption of the consecutive day requirement.

35. If a child receives cash assistance through the T.A.N.F. or F.E.P. programs, any agreement by the parties to reduce child support during extended parent-time must be approved by the Office of Recovery Services.

36. **Kandace Gayle Gallegos will give Justin Fidel Gallegos the information needed to set up direct deposit through Justin Fidel Gallegos's employer. Once Justin Fidel Gallegos has the information, Justin Fidel Gallegos will have Justin Fidel Gallegos's employer set up direct deposit to an account of Kandace Gayle Gallegos's choice. One half of the child support is due by the 5th of each month, and the other half is due by the 20th of each month.**

37. The issue of past-due child support may be decided by future court or administrative action.

38. **Justin Fidel Gallegos will pay any ORS fees. If Kandace Gayle Gallegos is the ORS applicant and the fees are withheld from payments to Kandace Gayle Gallegos, Justin Fidel Gallegos will reimburse Kandace Gayle Gallegos.**

39. The parties must notify each other within 30 days of any change in their income.

40. The parties can ask to change this child support order by motion after three years from the date of its entry if:

- there is a difference of 10% or more between the amount previously ordered and the new amount of child support under the Utah child support guidelines,
- the difference is not temporary, and
- the amount previously ordered was not a deviation from the child support guidelines.

If the children receive TANF funds at the time an adjustment is sought, ORS will review the order and ask the court to adjust the amount if appropriate. (Utah Code 62A-11-306.2).

41. The parties can ask to change this child support order at any time by petition if there has been a substantial change in circumstances because of material changes in:

- custody;
- the relative wealth or assets of the parties;
- income of a parent of 30% or more;
- the employment potential and ability of a parent to earn;
- the medical needs of the child; or
- the legal responsibilities of either parent for the support of others.

(Utah Code 81-6-202 and 81-6-212)

The change must result in a difference of 15% or more between the amount previously ordered and the new amount of child support under the Utah child support guidelines.

The difference may not be temporary.

The court can consider natural or adoptive children born after the entry of the decree other than those in common to both parties as part of a request to modify an existing award subject to limitations in the law. (Utah Code 81-6-202(8))

42. The Office of Recovery Services (<https://ors.utah.gov/>) provides services to individuals who are seeking assistance in the collection or enforcement of child support orders.

Dependent children for tax purposes

43. As long as **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** is current on all child support and other court-ordered financial obligations, **Kandace Gayle Gallegos** may claim the following children as dependents/exemptions for tax purposes as allowed by law:

a. **Graisyn & Paityn**

44. As long as **Justin Fidel Gallegos** is current on all child support and other court-ordered financial obligations, **Justin Fidel Gallegos** may claim the following children as dependents/exemptions for tax purposes as allowed by law:

b. **Aydrienne**

Child health care (Utah Code 81-6-208)

45. The parties must provide health care coverage for the medical expenses of the

dependent children. Health care coverage means coverage under which medical services are provided to a dependent child through: fee for service, a health maintenance organization, a preferred provider organization, any other type of private health insurance, or public health care coverage. Utah Code 81-6-101(14),

46. **n/a** must maintain medical, hospital, and dental care insurance for the dependent children if it is available at reasonable cost. If medical insurance is not available at reasonable cost then both parents must ensure the children have health care coverage. This may require applying for public health care coverage, such as CHIP or Medicaid.

a. If, at any time, a dependent child is covered by the medical, hospital, or dental insurance plans of both parents, the coverage will be as follows:

- **Justin Fidel Gallegos's** insurance will be primary coverage.
- **Kandace Gayle Gallegos's** insurance will be secondary coverage.

b. If a parent remarries and that parent's dependent child is not covered by that parent's health, hospital, or dental insurance plan but is covered by a step-parent's plan, the coverage will be as follows:

- **Justin Fidel Gallegos's** spouse's insurance will be primary coverage.
- **Kandace Gayle Gallegos's** spouse's insurance will be secondary coverage.

c. Both parties will equally share the out-of-pocket costs of the insurance premiums.

d. Both parties will equally share all uninsured and unreimbursed medical and dental expenses that are reasonable and necessary. This includes deductibles, co-insurance, and co-payments paid by a party for the dependent children.

e. The party who pays health care expenses must provide the other party written verification of the cost and payment within 30 days.

f. If a party does not follow this order and provide written verification, they may not be able to receive credit for health care expenses or recover the other party's share of the expenses.

g. On or before January 2 of each year, the party ordered to maintain coverage must provide verification of coverage to the other party, and ORS, if they are involved.

h. If there is any change in coverage, within 30 days of the change the party ordered to maintain coverage must notify the other party and ORS, if they are involved.

Child care expenses (Utah Code 81-6-209)

47. Both parties will equally share all reasonable work, career, or occupational training-related child care expenses.

a. The party who pays child care expenses must provide the other party written verification of the cost and identity of the child care provider. This must be done when a provider is first hired, and any time the other party asks for the information. The party incurring or paying child care expenses must notify the other party of any change of a child care provider or monthly expense. This must be done within 30 calendar days of the change.

b. The party not directly paying for child care must pay their share of child care

expenses as soon as they receive verification of the expenses.

c. If a party does **not** follow the order and provide written verification, they may not receive credit for work, career, or occupational training-related child care expenses or recover the other party's share of the expenses.




