(Utah Rule of Civil Procedure 100; Utah Uniform Child Custody Jurisdiction and Enforcement Act, UCCJEA, Utah Code 81-11-101 et seq.; Utah Uniform Interstate Family support Act, UIFSA, Utah Code 81-8-102 et seq.)

I say the following:

5. There are no custody, child support, or parent-time cases about **Leslie Batman** and **Joseph Roper's** minor children in any court or government agency. This includes filed, pending, and completed cases.

6. **Leslie Batman** and **Joseph Roper** have physical custody of our child(ren), and are the only people who have custody, child support, and parent-time rights to our child(ren).

PARENTING PLAN

This Parenting Plan is being filed in good faith.

This parenting plan is agreed to by **Leslie Batman** and **Joseph Roper**.

Children - custody

(Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 9, Part 3)

7. It is in the children's best interest that the parties be awarded Joint Legal Custody and that **Leslie Batman** be awarded Sole Physical custody. **Joseph Roper** should have parent-time at reasonable times and places. **Leslie Batman** is filing this Parenting Plan and verifies the plan is filed in good faith.

Parent-time

8. The parents will follow a custom parent-time schedule:

The parents will follow a custom parent-time schedule.

- a. **Leslie Batman has Atlas Roper at all times, aside from when Joseph Roper chooses to visit.**

Parent-time for special occasions

9. The parents will follow the schedule for special occasions below. If there is more than one child and the children's school schedules vary for purpose of a holiday, at the option of the parent exercising the holiday or the parent's half of the holiday, the children may remain together for the holiday period beginning the first evening that all children's schools are let out for the holiday and ending the evening before any child returns to school. (Utah Code 81-9-302, 303).

Curbside transfers

11. There will not be curbside transfers. The parent/person dropping-off or picking-up a child may accompany the children to the other parent/person when parent-time transfers are made.

Decision-making

12. Each parent will make day-to-day decisions for the children during the time they are caring for the children. Either parent may make emergency decisions affecting the health or safety of the children. A parent who makes an emergency decision must share the decision with the other parent as soon as reasonably possible.

Joint decision-making. The parents will share responsibility for making major decisions about the children. If there is a disagreement, the parents will resolve the dispute as provided in the Resolving disputes section below.

Education plan

13. The school the children will attend is based on **Leslie Batman's** home residence.

14. Leslie Batman has authority to check the children out of school. Leslie Batman has access to the children during school. If the parents cannot agree, education decisions will be made by Leslie Batman.

Communication with each other

15. Parents will communicate with each other by any method.

Communication with the children

16. The parents agree they will:

- provide age-appropriate help to the children to communicate with the other parent.
- give the children privacy during their communication with the other parent. The parents will not interfere with or monitor communication between the children and the other parent.

17. Parents and children may communicate with each other whenever the children choose.

- By any method

Records and information sharing

18. Both parents will have access to records and the ability to consult with providers regarding education, child care, and health care.

Travel by the children

19. During their parent-time, the parent may consent for the children to travel with a sports team, religious group, school group, relatives, friends, by themselves, or with others.

20. If the children will be travelling for more than **1** days, the parent arranging the travel will notify the other parent at least **30** days in advance. That parent will give the other parent the travel schedule, locations and phone numbers at least **14** days in advance. In case of emergency, the parent will provide as much notice as possible.

21. Other agreements about travel by the children: **Atlas Roper will not be traveling out of the state with Joseph Roper.**

Child care

22. A child care provider for our children must be:

Other qualifications: **Proven to be experienced in special needs care, have a driver's license, and provide verification of identity.**

Relocation of a parent (Utah Code 81-9-209)

23. If either parent moves more than 149 miles from the other, the moving parent must give the non-moving parent a written Notice of Relocation. The notice must be sent at least 60 days before the planned move.

a. The written Notice of Relocation must include:

- Information about the move;
- A proposed parent-time schedule; and
- A statement that the parents will not interfere with the other parent's parent-time.

b. If the moving parent does not give the non-moving parent a Notice of Relocation, the moving parent will be in contempt of the court's order.

24. If either parent lives more than 149 miles away from the other, or if the parents live a different countries, parent-time will be as the parties agree. If they are unable to agree, the following will be the minimum parent-time for the noncustodial parent:

Relocation Schedule (Utah Code 81-9-209)

a. in years ending in odd number, the minor children will spend the following holidays with the noncustodial parent:

- i. Thanksgiving holiday beginning Wednesday until Sunday; and

- ii. spring break, if applicable, beginning the last day of school before the holiday until the day before school resumes;
- b. in years ending in an even number, the minor children will spend the following holidays with the noncustodial parent:
 - i. the entire winter school break period; and
 - ii. the fall school break beginning the last day of school before the holiday until the day before school resumes; and
- c. extended parent-time equal to ½ of the summer or off-track time for consecutive weeks. The children will be returned to the custodial home no later than seven days before school begins. This week will be counted when determining the amount of parent-time to be divided between the parents for the summer or off-track period. The parties will mutually agree on this extended time each year. If they are unable to agree, the noncustodial parent will select the dates for the extended time period.
- d. One weekend per month at the option and expense of the noncustodial parent. The noncustodial parent's monthly weekend entitlement is subject to the following restrictions.
 - i. If the noncustodial parent has not designated a specific weekend for parent-time, the noncustodial parent will receive the last weekend of each month unless a holiday assigned to the custodial parent falls on that particular weekend. If a holiday assigned to the custodial parent falls on the last weekend of the month, the noncustodial parent will be entitled to the next to the last weekend of the month.
 - ii. If a noncustodial parent's extended parent-time or parent-time over a holiday extends into or through the first weekend of the next month, that weekend will be considered the noncustodial parent's monthly weekend entitlement for that month.
 - iii. If a child is out of school for teacher development days or snow days after the children begin the school year, or other days not included in the list of holidays in Subsection (5) and those days are contiguous with the noncustodial parent's monthly weekend parent-time, those days will be included in the weekend parent-time.
- e. The custodial parent is entitled to all parent-time not specifically allocated to the noncustodial parent.

25. Other terms about relocating: **Joseph Roper will pay for any plane tickets or gas to make a visit to Atlas Roper.**

26. If either parent lives more than 149 miles away from the other or the parents live in separate countries, costs for the children's travel expenses for parent-time will be paid by the .

27. If a parent has been found in contempt for not being current on all support obligations, and they do not have primary physical care of the child, they will be responsible for the child's related travel expenses.

28. Reimbursement for the child's travel expenses must be made within 30 days of receipt of documents detailing those expenses.

Resolving disputes

29. If the parents need to resolve a dispute regarding the children, they will discuss the issues in good faith and try to reach an agreement based on what is best for their children. If the parents are unable to agree, they will go to the following before bringing the issue to the court:

a. **Mediation**

Changing the plan

This plan remains in effect until changed. A change comes from a modification of a court order.

Military Parenting Plan (Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 10, Part 4)

This Military Parenting Plan is proposed by the **petitioner**.

30. This Military Parenting Plan is in addition to the standard Parenting Plan because **Respondent** is a servicemember.

Military Parenting Plan: Notice of deployment

31. After receiving notice of deployment, a deploying parent will give written notice to the other parent within 7 days or as soon as reasonably possible. If the non-deploying parent has a protective order against the deploying parent, the deploying parent will give written notice of deployment to the court. The written notice of deployment should include the destination, duration, and conditions.

Military Parenting Plan: Caretaking authority during deployment

32. Only **Respondent** is a servicemember. While **Respondent** is deployed, caretaking authority of the parties' children is given to:

- **Leslie Batman**, who is not deployed.
- **Joseph Roper** will keep some caretaking authority.

33. A person granted caretaking authority must notify the following people of any change in mailing or residential address:

- The deploying parent,
- Anyone with physical or legal custody,
- Anyone who has parent-time, right to access, visitation, and
- Anyone with authority to grant limited contact with the children.

34. However, if a person granted caretaking authority has a court order protecting their address, they must give written notice of any change in mailing or residential address to the court.

Military Parenting Plan: Decision-making authority during deployment

35. The people given caretaking authority above will have decision-making authority to:

- Make day-to-day decisions for the children during the time they are caring for the

children.

- Make emergency decisions affecting the health or safety of the children. A parent who makes an emergency decision must share the decisions with the other people who have caretaking authority as soon as reasonably possible.

Military Parenting Plan: Resolving disputes

36. If the people given caretaking authority need to resolve a dispute about the children, they will discuss the issues in good faith and try to reach an agreement based on what is best for the children.

37. If the people given caretaking authority are unable to agree, they will participate in the following before bringing the issue to the court:

- a. Mediation

Military Parenting Plan: Contact with the deployed parent

38. There will be contact with the children and the deployed parent. **Leslie Batman** will arrange for the contact. Contact will be as follows:

Frequency: Weekly

Duration: However long Joseph Roper is able to communicate while deployed.

Method: Facetime, Skype, Other forms of video or phone call

Military Parenting Plan: Contact when deployed parent is on leave or is otherwise available

39. When the deployed parent is on leave or is otherwise available, contact with the children will be as follows:

- b. **When available.**

Military Parenting Plan: Child support not modified

40. Child support obligations cannot be modified by the Military Parenting Plan.

41. Changing child support requires a court order.

42. The arrangements in this Military Parenting Plan terminate immediately upon return.

END OF PARENTING PLAN

Income: Petitioner (Leslie Batman) (Utah Code 81-6-203)

43. **Leslie Batman's** gross monthly income for child support purposes is **\$2080**. **Leslie Batman** base child support amount using the **sole** custody calculation is **\$246**. **Leslie Batman** receives the following gross monthly income:

Income: Respondent (Joseph Roper) (Utah Code 81-6-203)

44. **Joseph Roper's** gross monthly income for child support purposes is **\$6421**. **Joseph Roper's** base child support amount using the **sole** custody calculation is **\$665**. **Joseph Roper** receives the following gross monthly income:

- a. **Joseph Roper** is ordered to pay **700** per month in child support for children not part of this case. This amount is subtracted from their gross monthly income for the

child support calculation.

45. The adjusted gross monthly income for **Joseph Roper** is **\$5721**.

Child support (Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 6, Parts 1 and 2)

46. **Leslie Batman** believes the guideline amount for child support is unjust, inappropriate, or not in the best interest of our children for the following reasons:

The reason(s) for deviation are Joseph Roper has agreed to paying \$900 per month when combining child support and alimony..

47. It is in the best interest of the children that **Joseph Roper** be ordered to pay child support to **Leslie Batman** as follows:

- a. **\$660.00** per month. This deviates from the Utah Uniform Child Support Guidelines.
- b. Unless the Court orders otherwise, support for each child ends when:
 - a child turns 18 or has graduated from high school during the child's normal and expected year of graduation, whichever occurs later, or
 - a child dies, marries, becomes a member of the United States armed forces, or is emancipated (Utah Code 78A-6-801).

48. Once a child is no longer eligible to receive child support, the support amount for the eligible children should be recalculated using the child support worksheet (Utah Code Title 81, Chapter 6, Parts 1 and 2). The parties may not divide the base child support award by the number of children and subtract that amount from the prior child support amount.

49. **Leslie Batman** will give **Joseph Roper** the information needed to set up direct deposit through **Joseph Roper's** employer. Once **Joseph Roper** has the information, **Joseph Roper** will have **Joseph Roper's** employer set up direct deposit to an account of **Leslie Batman's** choice. One half of the child support is due by the 5th of each month, and the other half is due by the 20th of each month.

50. The issue of past-due child support may be decided by future court or administrative action.

51. **Joseph Roper** will pay any ORS fees. If **Leslie Batman** is the ORS applicant and the fees are withheld from payments to **Leslie Batman**, **Joseph Roper** will reimburse **Leslie Batman**.

52. The parties must notify each other within 30 days of any change in their income.

53. The Office of Recovery Services (<https://ors.utah.gov/>) provides services to individuals who are seeking assistance in the collection or enforcement of child support orders.

Dependent children for tax purposes

54. The parents may claim the parties' children as dependents/exemptions for tax purposes as follows:

55. **Leslie Batman** may claim the parties' children as dependents/exemptions for tax purposes in odd numbered years. **Joseph Roper** may claim the parties' children as dependents/exemptions for tax purposes in even numbered years.

Child health care (Utah Code 81-6-208)

56. The parties must provide health care coverage for the medical expenses of the dependent children. Health care coverage means coverage under which medical services are provided to a dependent child through: fee for service, a health maintenance organization, a preferred provider organization, any other type of private health insurance, or public health care coverage. Utah Code 81-6-101(14),

57. **Joseph Roper** must maintain medical, hospital, and dental care insurance for the dependent children if it is available at reasonable cost. If medical insurance is not available at reasonable cost then both parents must ensure the children have health care coverage. This may require applying for public health care coverage, such as CHIP or Medicaid.

a. If, at any time, a dependent child is covered by the medical, hospital, or dental insurance plans of both parents, the coverage will be as follows:

- **Joseph Roper's** insurance will be primary coverage.
- **Leslie Batman's** insurance will be secondary coverage.

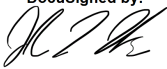
