Creation and Authority of the Judicial Conduct Commission

Although it had existed previously as a legislatively created body, Utah's Judicial Conduct Commission (JCC) was constitutionally established in 1984. Constitution of Utah, Article VIII, Section 13. The constitution authorizes the Legislature to statutorily establish the composition and procedures of the JCC. Those provisions are found in Utah Code Ann., Title 78A, Chapter 11.

The JCC is empowered to investigate and conduct confidential hearings regarding complaints against state, county and municipal judges throughout the state. The JCC may recommend the reprimand, censure, suspension, removal, or involuntary retirement of a judge for any of the following reasons:

- action which constitutes willful misconduct in office;
- final conviction of a crime punishable as a felony under state or federal law;
- willful and persistent failure to perform judicial duties;
- disability that seriously interferes with the performance of judicial duties; or
- conduct prejudicial to the administration of justice which brings a judicial office into disrepute.

Prior to the implementation of any such JCC recommendation, the Utah Supreme Court reviews the JCC's proceedings as to both law and fact. The Supreme Court then issues an order implementing, rejecting, or modifying the JCC's recommendation.

Number of Complaints Received in FY 2012

Of the 96 complaints received in FY 2012, 72 have been resolved and 24 are still pending.

Confidentiality of JCC Records and Proceedings

Except in certain limited circumstances specified by statute, all complaints, papers and testimony received or maintained by the JCC, and the record of any confidential hearings conducted by the JCC, are confidential, and cannot be disclosed.

Sanctions and Other Resolutions

Sanctions Implemented by the Utah Supreme Court

There were no public sanctions implemented by the Utah Supreme Court during FY 2012.

Sanctions Recommended by the Judicial Conduct Commission

Reprimand. On August 24, 2011, the JCC recommended that Justice Court Judge Keith Stoney be reprimanded for issuing a \$10,000 cash only bench warrant in response to a woman's inappropriate behavior toward court clerks. At the conclusion of FY 2012, the recommendation was pending before the Utah Supreme Court.

Reprimand. On April 23, 2102, pursuant to stipulation, the JCC recommended that retired Justice Court Judge Robert Peters be reprimanded for, in a criminal case: (1) engaging in an ex parte communication with a law enforcement official; and (2) pursuant to the information obtained in the communication, revoking the defendant's probation without following the statutory procedures. At the conclusion of FY 2012, the recommendation was pending before the Utah Supreme Court.

Censure. On May 31, 2012, pursuant to stipulation, the JCC recommended that Justice Court Judge Kevin Christensen be censured for having received combined salaries in excess of the amount allowed by law. State law provides that a justice court judge employed by more than one governmental entity may not receive a total salary for service as a justice court judge greater than the salary of a district court judge. Judge Christensen serves in four courts. and received excessive salaries for calendar years 2009 through 2011. Judge Christensen the right to challenge constitutionality of the salary limitation statute, and that challenge is pending before the Utah Supreme Court.

Dismissals with Warnings Issued by the Judicial Conduct Commission

Dismissal with a Warning. On December 22, 2011, the JCC dismissed a complaint filed against a justice court judge who engaged in an ex parte scheduling discussion with a small claims litigant without promptly notifying the other party and giving the other party the opportunity to respond. The JCC found that the misconduct was troubling but relatively minor misbehavior for which no public sanction was warranted.

Dismissals with a Warning. On March 12, 2012, the JCC issued two dismissals with a warning to a justice court judge, having found that the misconducts were troubling but relatively minor misbehavior for which no public sanction was warranted. When a JCC complaint is dismissed, JCC rules allow the complainant to request that the investigation be re-opened. The complainant made such a request, which the JCC granted. The two dismissals with a warning are on hold pending the outcome of the additional investigation.

Dismissal with a Warning. On June 12, 2012, the JCC dismissed a complaint filed against a district court judge who sentenced a defendant: (1) without providing the defendant the opportunity to be sentenced between 2 and 45 days later, as provided by statute; and (2) without giving the defendant the opportunity to address the court prior to sentencing. The JCC found that the misconduct was troubling but relatively minor misbehavior for which no public sanction was warranted.

The JCC meets as needed on the second Tuesday of each month at the Utah Law & Justice Center in Salt Lake City. The JCC met ten times during FY 2012.

Budget


Most of the JCC's budget is appropriated annually by the Legislature. Additional funding comes from agency savings in prior years. For FY 2012, the legislative appropriation was \$206,600; expenses totaled \$239,742. In order to balance its budget for FY 2012, the JCC was required to use \$33,142 from its prior years' savings.



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

Motion to further amend Rule 4-202.02.

The May 3 draft of Rule 4-202.02 is behind Tab 10.

Judge Gregory Orme moves the following further amendments to Rule 4-202.02. and that the rule as further amended be published for comment:

- 1. Line 37. After "party" insert "or a victim or witness of a crime."
- 2. Line 137. After "party" insert "or a victim or witness of a crime."
- Line 252. Add:
 - (8)(E) the following information about a victim or witness of a crime:
 - (8)(E)(i) business and personal address, email address, telephone number and similar information from which the person can be located or contacted;
 - (8)(E)(ii) date of birth, driver's license number, social security number, account description and number, password, identification number, maiden name, mother's maiden name, and similar personal identifying information.

Currently, contact information and indentifying information of victims and witnesses of a crime is classified the same as that of any other non-party: some is public and some is private. A classification of private keeps the information out of the hands of the public, but the defendant still has access, which may be cause for concern. Section 77-38-6 says that a victim or witness of a crime cannot be compelled to testify about information such as this. This amendment would include records with this information in the new classification of "safeguarded." Under the separate proposed amendments to Rule 4-202.03, parties will not have access to safeguarded records.

1. WELCOME AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES: (Chief Justice Matthew B. Durrant)

Chief Justice Durrant welcomed everyone to the meeting. A special welcome was extended to a group of Ukrainian judges and court officials. Judge John Kennedy introduced the visitors. Chief Justice Durrant provided background information as to the role of the Judicial Council as the governing body of the Utah Court system.

Motion: Judge Maughan moved to approve the minutes from the March 15, 2013 Judicial Council meeting. Judge Sandberg seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

2. CHAIR'S REPORT: (Chief Justice Matthew B. Durrant)

Chief Justice Durrant reported on the following:

He recently spoke at the Justice Court Judges Conference in St George and at the Juvenile Court Conference in Midway.

The Council's JPEC Workgroup met with the Judicial Performance Evaluation Commission at their April meeting. Mr. Schwermer will provide a more detailed report later on the agenda.

3. ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT: (Daniel J. Becker)

Mr. Becker reported on the following items:

Juvenile Court Administrator. Ms. Lisa-Michele Church has submitted her resignation, effective April 30, 2013. The recruitment process has begun, and Mr. Becker has met with the Board of Juvenile Court Judges to discuss the process in filling the vacancy with them. Mr. Ray Wahl will assume the duties of the Juvenile Court Administrator until the vacancy has been filled.

<u>Judicial Vacancies</u>. Judge Michael Lyon has announced his upcoming retirement, effective September 1, 2013.

Mr. Kymber Housely, the Governor's appointment to fill the First District vacancy, has withdrawn his name for consideration.

Mr. Becker mentioned that there are six judicial vacancies in the process of being filled to include: 1) 1st District, 2) 2nd District, 3) 3rd Juvenile, 4) 3rd District, 5) 8th District, and 6) 8th Juvenile.

GAL Director. Ms. Elizabeth Knight has been hired to fill the vacancy for the GAL Director. She will begin working for the courts on April 29. Mr. Becker provided background of her work experience.

Standing Committee on Children and Family Law (SCCFL). Senator Weiler has been appointed as the Senate representative to the committee.

2017 Court Technology Conference. Salt Lake City has been selected to host the 2017 court technology conference. This conference draws a large number of national and international attendees.

SB 77 – Availability of Government Information. This bill requires certain public bodies to post minutes and audio recordings of meetings on the Utah Public Notice Website, and it modifies the manner and time of making minutes public. Policy and Planning will review the legislation and address the necessary rule changes. This bill becomes effective in May, and the recording of the May Council meeting will be posted to the Public Notice Website.

4. **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

Management Committee Report:

Chief Justice Durrant reported that the Management Committee meeting minutes accurately reflect the issues discussed. The items needing to be addressed by the Council have been placed on today's agenda.

Liaison Committee Report:

No meeting was held in April.

Policy and Planning Meeting:

No meeting was held in April.

Bar Commission Report:

Mr. Lund reported on the following:

The Commission has not met since their March meeting.

He highlighted the Bar's election results to include: 1) Mr. Curtis Jensen, President-elect, will serve as the Bar's president for the 2013-2014 year, 2) Mr. James Gilson was selected to serve as the President-elect of the Bar, 3) Mr. Kenyan Dove was selected as the Second District representative to the Bar Commission, 4) Ms. Susanne Gustin and Mr. John Lund were selected as Third District representatives to the Bar Commission.

5. BOARD OF JUSTICE COURT JUDGES UPDATE: (Judge David Marx)

Chief Justice Durrant welcomed Judge Marx to the meeting.

Judge Marx provided an update to the Council on the activities of the Board of Justice Court Judges. He highlighted the following in his update: 1) completion of the judges annual conference which included small claims training and leadership and mentoring training, 2) the first of two clerks conferences is to be held this week, 3) revised judicial weighted workload formula, 4) approaching a one-year benchmark of recorded proceedings in the justice courts, 5) outreach awareness, 6) compliance with private provider opinion, 7) JPEC and the justice courts, 8) reviewing ways to educate judges and advance evidenced-based sentencing, 9) advancing paperless systems in the justice courts, and 10) defining/advancing judicial independence at the justice court level.

Judge Marx was thanked for all he has accomplished, on behalf of the justice courts, as the Board chair.

It was noted that Judge Marx has been selected to fill the vacancy on the Judicial Council in October when Judge McCullagh's second term has expired.

6. APPOINTMENT OF SENIOR JUDGES TO COMMITTEES: (Tim Shea)

On behalf of the Court Interpreter Committee, Mr. Shea reported that Judge Noonan has stepped down as the Juvenile Court judge representative. After recruitment efforts were extended to the juvenile judges, no interest was expressed. A juvenile senior judge has agreed to fill the vacancy, if approved by the Council. Mr. Shea noted that the Board of Juvenile Court Judges has approved the appointment of a juvenile senior judge to the Committee.

The matter was discussed with the Management Committee at their April meeting. The Management Committee deferred the matter to the Council for discussion and action.

Discussion took place regarding the precedent of appointing a senior judge to serve on a standing committee.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Maughan moved to send the matter back to the Board of Juvenile Court Judges for additional recruitment efforts to fill the vacancy on the Court Interpreter Committee for a juvenile judge representative. Justice Parrish seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

7. COURT INTERPRETER – INCREASE IN HOURLY FEE: (Tim Shea)

Mr. Shea requested approval of a one percent increase of the hourly fee for court interpreters to coincide with the one percent salary increase approved by the legislature for state employees. The funding for the increase would come from the Juror/Witness/Interpreter Fund.

Motion: Judge Maughan moved to approve the proposed interpreter fee schedule for FY 2014. Judge Hornak seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

8. MANDATORY E-FILING REPORT: (Ron Bowmaster and Debra Moore)

Ms. Moore and Mr. Bowmaster were welcomed to the meeting.

Mr. Bowmaster highlighted the following e-filing dates in his update: 1) mandatory civil/domestic e-filing, effective April 1, 2013; 2) mandatory probate e-filing, effective July 1, 2013; 3) general civil e-filing, originally started in March 2010; and 4) domestic/probate/small claims e-filing, became available in January 2013.

In anticipation of the mandatory e-filing date, the following communication was provided to prepare for the move: 1) notices were printed in the Bar Journal, 2) exhibition booths set up at various Bar Conferences, 3) publication of brochures and best practice guides, and 4) statewide and local training sessions were held.

E-filing status data was provided to include: 1) number of attorneys registered to file electronically, 2) percentage of civil case filings, 3) help desk support, 4) number of criminal electronic case filings, and 5) noted upcoming changes to the signature application, formatting of documents, and OCAP implementation and e-filing capability.

Ms. Moore highlighted the following in her update: 1) the move to mandatory e-filing transitioned smoothly, 2) development of Phase 2 of the judicial workspace application is underway, 3) statistics on the hearing preparation and management of the judicial workspace application was provided, 4) signing application enhancements are being addressed, 5) Rich Text Format (RTF) document formatting issues being addressed, and 6) all additional/upgraded equipment requested by the districts has been delivered and installed.

Discussion took place. Questions were asked relative to the Appellate Courts Panel Management System and the Juvenile Court e-filing plan. Clarification was provided.

Gratitude was expressed to all court staff involved with the move to mandatory e-filing and its smooth transition.

Mr. Becker noted that a review of contract sites and the type of services provided at the contract sites due to the impact of e-filing is forthcoming. More specific recommendations relative to this matter will be provided at a future meeting.

9. REPORT ON EFFORTS TO IMPROVE GUARDIANSHIP AND CONSERVATORSHIP APPOINTMENTS: (Tim Shea)

Mr. Shea provided an update to the Council on the courts' efforts to improve guardianship and conservatorship appointments. Background information was provided to what has taken place. Mr. Shea highlighted the following in his report: 1) recognized and thanked Judge Harmond for staffing the ad hoc committee; 2) the work of staff in developing web pages, forms, bench books, and reference manuals; 3) development of the Court Visitor Program being staffed by Ms. Karolina Abuzyarova, Program Coordinator, and Ms. Michaelle Jones, Volunteer

Coordinator; 4) passing of HB 327 – Probate Amendments which includes a definition of incapacity, requires nationally recognized credentials for qualification as a professional guardian, and express recognition of the judge's authority to direct the inquiries of a court; and 5) establishment of a workgroup by the Board of District Court judges to examine the role of the court in trying to re-establish contact with guardians and conservators with whom the court has lost contact.

Discussion took place.

Mr. Shea was thanked for all he has done with the guardianship and conservatorship matters.

10. JPEC UPDATE: (Rick Schwermer)

Mr. Schwermer provided an update to the Council on the April JPEC Meeting, attended by the Council's JPEC workgroup.

He highlighted the following in his update: 1) discussion on the integrity of the survey data and methodology for judges up for retention in 2014, 2) concerns regarding the judicial performance evaluation process, 3) comments provided by Commission members, and 4) a response, in written form, will be provided by the Commission chair.

Discussion took place.

11. FY 14 OPERATIONAL BUDGET UPDATE: (Ray Wahl and Daniel J. Becker)

The recommendations for the FY 14 operational budget for the courts were reviewed by Mr. Wahl and Mr. Becker.

The following ongoing general fund recommendations were highlighted: 1) drug court funding, 2) data processing e-filing programming funding, 3) transfer from contracts line item for Utah Code Annotated funding, 4) VOIP budget savings, 5) fund one time-limited law clerk, 6) juvenile law clerk, fund 50% from ongoing funds, 7) clerical restructuring plan – final installment - clerical increase, 8) career track, 9) market comparability adjustments, and 10) legislative actions requiring funding.

The recommendations for one-time funding were reviewed.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Steele moved to approve the FY 14 operational budget for the courts as proposed. Judge Dawson seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

12. RESOURCES FOR SELF-REPRESENTED PARTIES COMMITTEE UPDATE: (Judge John Baxter and Tim Shea)

Chief Justice Durrant welcomed Judge Baxter to the meeting.

Judge Baxter provided an update to the Council on behalf of the Resources for Self-Represented Parties Committee.

The Self-Help Center functions as a virtual center providing services through the following channels: 1) by phone, 2) by mail, 3) through texting, 4) and online.

Judge Baxter provided background information on the Self-Help Center. He reminded the Council that the center was developed five years ago starting in two judicial districts. The center is currently staff by Ms. Mary Jane Ciccarello and six part-time attorneys.

Training on the use of the Self-Help Center, awareness of the Self-Help Center as a resource, and development and posting of available forms on the court's website continues.

Judge Baxter highlighted the following numbers reflective of the contacts using the center: 1) in 2008, 830 contacts; 2) in 2013, 11,113 contacts, and 3) an average of 77 contacts per day.

Mr. Becker noted a public outreach meeting was held last week at the Calvary Baptist Church, and Ms. Ciccarello presented on the Self-Help Center.

Judge Baxter was thanked for his update.

13. SENIOR JUDGE CERTIFICATION: (Tim Shea)



1. WELCOME AND APPROVAL OF MINUTES: (Chief Justice Matthew B. Durrant)

Chief Justice Durrant welcomed everyone to the meeting. After reviewing the minutes, the following motion was made:

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Atherton moved to approve the minutes. Judge Harmond seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

2. ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT: (Daniel J. Becker)

He reported on the following items:

<u>Judicial Retirements</u>. Judge Larry Steele has announced his upcoming retirement, effective December 1. Judge Paul Iwasaki has announced his upcoming retirement, effective September 16. Mr. Becker noted that this leaves seven judicial vacancies to be filled.

JPEC. Mr. Myron March resigned from his position on the Judicial Performance Evaluation Commission, effective immediately. An appointment will be made by the Supreme Court to fill the vacancy.

Case Filings/Weighted Caseload. The case filing reports as of April 30, 2013 reflect a 1% decrease in district court case filings and a 10% decrease in juvenile court referrals. The weighted caseload data reflects that collectively statewide, the number of judges needed closely matches the number of actual judges in both district and juvenile court. For comparison, in 2009 there were five of the eight districts over 100% for weighted caseload in district court and six of the eight districts were over 100% for weighted caseload in juvenile court.

<u>Juvenile Court Administrator</u>. The job posting to fill this vacancy has been reposted for an additional 30 days.





3. COMMITTEE APPOINTMENTS: (Liz Knight, Ron Bowmaster, and Tim Shea) Ms. Knight reviewed the recommendations to fill three vacancies on the Guardian ad Litem Oversight Committee to include: 1) Mr. David Littlefield, 2) Mr. Gerald Hardcastle, 3) Mr. Michael Jorgensen, 4) Ms. Angela Fonnesbeck, and 5) Ms. Karen Flynn.

Discussion took place.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Sandberg moved to approve the names of Ms. Karen Flynn, Mr. Michael Jorgensen, and Ms. Angela Fonnesbeck to fill the three vacancies on the Guardian ad Litem Oversight Committee and place them on the May Judicial Council consent calendar. Judge Hornak seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

The Court Interpreter Committee has a vacancy for a certified interpreter resulting from the resignation of Ms. Dinorah Padro. Ms. Nidia Pendley and Mr. Luther Gaylord are being recommended to fill the vacancy. Judge Trease, Committee chair, recommended the vacancy be filled by Ms. Pendley.

Judge Rick Smith has applied to fill the vacancy for a juvenile court judge left with the resignation of Judge Mary Noonan.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Sandberg moved to approve the recommendation of Ms Nidia Pendley to fill the certified interpreter vacancy and Judge Rick Smith to fill the juvenile court judge vacancy on the Court Interpreter Committee and place it on the May Judicial Council consent calendar. Judge Harmond seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

Mr. Shea noted that a vacancy for a criminal defense attorney now exists on the Court Interpreter Committee and recommendations for filling the vacancy will be provided at a future meeting.

The Standing Committee on Technology requested the reappointment of Judge Morris to serve on the committee for a third term. Discussion took place regarding the fact that Judge Morris had completed a full two terms on the Committee.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Sandberg moved to request the Board of District Court Judges submit several names for consideration to fill the vacancy left with Judge Morris' second term expiring. Judge Harmond seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

4. HR POLICY APPROVAL: (Rob Parkes)

The Education Assistance Policy has been revised. It was reviewed by the court executives prior to this meeting. Mr. Parkes highlighted the following policy changes: 1) an increase in the amount reimbursed for education assistance from \$1,000 per fiscal year to \$5,250 per fiscal year (would make the courts consistent with the Executive Branch in the maximum amount reimbursable), 2) addition of a more formal application process, and 3) the recommendation for employees to attend classes during nonworking hours with a noted exception to this procedure.

Discussion took place. Clarification was provided relative to reimbursement for coursework counting towards a Bachelor's degree which would include Associate degree coursework.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Atherton moved to approve the Education Assistance Policy as amended and place it on the May Judicial Council consent calendar. Judge Harmond seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

The Second Language Stipends Policy is new. This policy was reviewed by the court executives prior to this meeting. The purpose of this policy is to establish a uniform procedure for the administration of second language stipends.

Mr. Parkes reviewed the policy as proposed. Discussion took place.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Atherton moved to approve the proposed Second Language Stipends Policy and place it on the May Judicial Council consent calendar. Judge Sandberg seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

5. ATTORNEY EXCLUSION REPORT: (Tim Shea)

Mr. Shea reported that six commissioners are subject to an attorney survey. Rule 3-111 allows court commissioners to request that an attorney be removed as a potential respondent, if the commissioner believes the attorney will not respond objectively.

Commissioners Casey and Dillon have requested that an attorney be excluded from the potential respondent pool of their surveys. Discussion took place.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Hornak moved to exclude the requested attorneys from the potential respondent pool for Commissioners Casey and Dillon. Judge Atherton seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

6. FULL AUDIT, FOURTH DISTRICT, MILLARD COUNTY, DELTA CITY JUSTICE COURT: (Heather Mackenzie-Campbell)

Chief Justice Durrant welcomed Ms. Mackenzie-Campbell to the meeting.

Ms. Mackenzie-Campbell reviewed the findings of the Millard County, Delta City Justice Court full audit. In her report, she highlighted commendable procedures, as well as, areas needing significant improvement.

In the current justice court audit, the audit staff noted that the half time justice court clerk also works half time for the Millard County Sheriff's office located in the same building as the court. Discussion took place.

The matter of the county clerk working for the justice court and the sheriff's office will be deferred to the June Management Committee meeting for further discussion. Mr. Brent Johnson will be asked to address this issue.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Atherton moved to accept the Millard County, Delta City Justice Court Full Audit as presented. Judge Sandberg seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Hornak moved to enter into an executive session to discuss a matter concerning professional competency. The motion was seconded, and it passed unanimously.

7. TAYLORSVILLE JUSTICE COURT: (Rick Schwermer)

This matter was discussed in an executive session.

8. UINTAH/HUNTSVILLE JUSTICE COURT INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT: (Rick Schwermer)

Mr. Schwermer reminded the Management Committee of Huntsville Town's original request for approval to enter into an interlocal agreement with the Uintah Justice Court. Currently, they receive services from Roy City Court.

At this time, all parties are in agreement to enter into an interlocal agreement with the Uintah Justice Court.

<u>Motion</u>: Judge Hornak moved to recommend the approval of an interlocal agreement between Huntsville Town and the Uintah Justice Court effective Sep 1, 2013. Judge Harmond seconded the motion, and it passed unanimously.



Discussion: Three rules were published for comment:

- CJA 02-0206. Effective date of rules.
- CJA 04-0610. Appointment of justice court judges to preside at first appearances, preliminary hearings and arraignments.
- CJA 07-0304. Probation supervision.

We did not receive any comments.

Rule 2-206 would change the normal effective dates of Council rules from April 1 and November 1 to May 1 and November 1. Rule 4-610 is a technical amendment, recognizing that preliminary hearings are now required in Class A misdemeanors. Rule 7-304 would change the time for filing and reviewing supervision plans and includes the Balanced and Restorative Justice Model throughout the case planning process. Judge Steele said that the probation chiefs and the Board of Juvenile Court Judges recommend that paragraph (4) be deleted because it deals with day-to-day management rather than policy. He moved to delete paragraph (4) and the committee agreed.

Rule 1-206. Criteria for leadership positions.

Discussion: This rule is the result of discussions started at the planning workshop in Moab in October 2012. An earlier concept, requiring a minimum number of years as a judge before serving in leadership positions, was circulated to the boards of judges and the presiding judges. As a result of that input, the approach was changed to describe the qualities that judges should look for in the leaders they select.

Judge Maughan and Judge Dawson said that the Board of District Court Judges opposed the rule. Judge Steele said the juvenile judges favored it. Judge Parkin said that the Board of Justice Court Judges favored the rule. The committee discussed ways in which the message could be communicated without a rule. Judge Orme said that the message might be lost over time. The committee agreed to present the draft rule to the Council without a recommendation.

Action: Present the draft rule to the Council without a recommendation.

Rule 4-202.02. Records classification.

Rule 4-202.03. Records access.

Discussion: The amendments address three separate topics. Judge Orme described the changes to Rule 4-202.02 requested by the appellate courts to better protect sensitive information in appeals from juvenile court. These amendments would be in conjunction with changes to the Utah Rules of Appellate Procedure.

Mr. Shea described the changes to Rule 4-202.03 requested by the Board of Juvenile Court Judges. The juvenile court judges recognize the demands of due process to allow access to records being used as part of the judge's decision making process, but they also need the discretion to control access so that access does not harm the child's best interests. Mr. Shea pointed out the authority of a legal representative of the subject of the record to delegate access to a third person by a notarized statement. After discussion the

committee concluded that this should be raised with the Board during the comment period.

Mr. Shea described the changes to Rule 4-202.02 and Rule 4-202.03 that would create a new classification of "safeguarded" records and regulate access to them. "Safeguarded" is a term used in federal and state law to protect the contact information of a petitioner in divorce and cohabitant abuse actions from disclosure to the other party. The statutes require that this level of protection must be requested, and the draft rule includes that requirement. The classification of "private" is inadequate because the parties can access private records. Access to safeguarded records would be similar to access to private records, but excluding the parties.

The amendments will also more clearly describe access to jurors' names and contact information. Jurors' and prospective jurors' contact information would be safeguarded; neither the public nor the parties would have access. Jurors' and prospective jurors' names would be private before and during trial; the parties would have access but not the public. The jurors' — but not the prospective jurors' — names would be public five days after the trial. Mr. Shea said that according to his research the judge can keep the identity of the jury confidential before and during trial to protect the integrity of the trial. However, after trial, the names of the jurors are required to be public unless there is a threat to the jurors' safety.


The committee further amended the rule to change 5 days to 10. The committee further amended the rule to accommodate an anonymous jury in which the judge keeps the names of the jurors from the parties. The committee further amended the rule to accommodate protection of a juror's family.

Re: Rules for expedited effective date

The Policy and Planning Committee recommends that the following rules be published for comment. The committee also recommends that, under Rule 2-205, they be made effective on the dates indicated. All of the amendments are intended to implement legislation effective on those dates.

Rule summary

CJA 02-0103. Open and closed meetings. Technical changes. Imposes on the Judicial Council the new requirements imposed on public bodies by SB 77. Should be effective May 14.

CJA 02-0104. Recording meetings. Requires additional public records to be published on the Utah Public Notice Website. Imposes on the Judicial Council the new requirements imposed on public bodies by SB 77. Should be effective May 14.

CJA 04-0906. Guardian ad litem program. Implements the requirements of Section 78A-2-228 for private guardian ad litem attorneys. Should be effective July 1.

CJA 06-0401. Domestic relations commissioners. Includes dating violence protective orders, authorized by HB 50, within the authority of court commissioners. Should be effective May 14.

Encl. Draft rules

Rule 2-103. Draft: April 8, 2013

Rule 2-103. Open and closed meetings.

2 Intent:

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- To establish the Council's responsibility for providing public notice of its meetings and to ensure the opportunity for public attendance at Council meetings.
- To establish procedures consistent with the philosophy of the Utah Open and Public Meetings Act.
 - To provide the Council with sufficient flexibility to close meetings when discussing matters of a sensitive nature.
- 9 Applicability:
- 10 This rule shall apply to all meetings of the Council.
- 11 Statement of the Rule:
 - (1) Definitions. As used in this rule "meeting" means the gathering of a quorum of the Council, whether in person or by means of electronic communication, for the purpose of discussing or acting upon any matter over which the Council has jurisdiction, but does not include a chance or social meeting of Council members.
 - (2) Public notice of meetings.
 - (2)(A) After the Council has set its annual meeting schedule, the administrative office of the courts shall publish on the court's website and on the Utah Public Notice Website the date, time and place of the meetings-on the courts' website. At least 24 hours before each meeting, the administrative office of the courts shall post on the websites the meeting agenda and notify at least one newspaper of general circulation within the state of the postings. The administrative office of the courts shall notify a media agency of the postings by email upon request for routine notice. The Council may address a matter not on the meeting agenda but will take no final action on the matter.
 - (2)(B) When, due to unforeseen circumstances, it is necessary for the Council to consider matters of an urgent nature, the requirement of public notice may be suspended and the best notice practicable given. No such meeting of the Council shall be held unless:
- 29 (2)(B)(i) an attempt has been made to notify all members;
 - (2)(B)(ii) at least a quorum is present; and

(2)(B)(iii) a majority of those present vote to hold the meeting.

32 (3) Open meetings. Meetings of the Council are open to the public unless closed as 33 provided in this rule.

(4) Reasons for closed meetings.

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- A closed meeting of the Council may be held for discussions regarding any of the following:
- 37 (4)(A) the character, professional competence, or physical or mental health of an individual;
- 39 (4)(B) collective bargaining or litigation;
 - (4)(C) the purchase, exchange or lease of real property if public discussion of the transaction would disclose the appraisal or estimated value of the property under consideration or prevent the Council from completing the transaction on the best possible terms:
 - (4)(D) the sale of real property if:
 - (4)(D)(i) public discussion of the transaction would disclose the appraisal or estimated value of the property under consideration or prevent the Council from completing the transaction on the best possible terms;
 - (4)(D)(ii) the Council has previously given public notice that the property would be offered for sale; and
 - (4)(D)(iii) the terms of the sale are publicly disclosed before the Council approves the sale;
- 52 (4)(E) deployment of security personnel or devices;
- 53 (4)(F) allegations of criminal misconduct; or
 - (4)(G) consideration of a private, protected, sealed, juvenile court social or juvenile court legal record as defined in Rule 4-202.02.
 - (5) Procedure for closing a meeting.
 - (5)(A) A closed meeting may be held only upon the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present at an open meeting for which public notice is given, provided a quorum is present.

(5)(B) The recording and minutes otherwise required by Rule 2-104 shall not be made if a meeting is closed to discuss the character, competence, or physical or mental health of an individual or to discuss the deployment of security personnel or devices. The presiding officer shall sign a sworn statement, which is a public record, affirming that the sole purpose for closing the meeting is to discuss the character, competence, or physical or mental health of an individual or the deployment of security personnel, devices, or systems.

- (6) Limit on actions at a closed meeting. No contract, appointment, rule or resolution may be approved at a closed meeting. A contract, appointment, rule or resolution approved at an open meeting may be based upon discussions had at a closed meeting.
- (7) Limit on discussions outside of closed meeting. No one who attends a closed meeting may disclose information discussed or materials distributed outside of the closed meeting except with
 - (A) others who participated in the closed meeting, and
 - (B) a member of the Judicial Council.

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- (8) Right of removal. All or any part of an open meeting may be recorded by any person in attendance, provided the recording does not interfere with the conduct of the meeting. The Council may order the removal of any person who disrupts a meeting.
- (9) The administrative office of the courts shall annually train the members of the Council on the requirements of this rule and of Rule 2-104.

 - (2)(A) The <u>audio</u> recording of a closed meeting is a protected record. The <u>audio</u> recording of an open meeting is a public record. Minutes of an open meeting awaiting approval by the Council are a public record. The approved minutes of an open meeting are a public record.
 - (2)(B) The recording of an open meeting-shall be available within three days after the meeting to which it pertains. Minutes awaiting approval by the Council shall be clearly identified as "unapproved" and made available within a reasonable time-30 days after the meeting to which they pertain. - (5)(A) A guardian ad litem employed by the Administrative Office of the Courts is an at-will employee subject to dismissal by the Director with or without cause.

Prior to the Director making a selection, a panel shall interview applicants and make hiring recommendations to the Director. The interview panel shall consist of the Director (or Director's designee) and two or more of the following persons:

- (2) Authority of court commissioner. Court commissioners shall have the following authority:
 - (2)(A) Upon notice, require the personal appearance of parties and their counsel;
- (2)(B) Require the filing of financial disclosure statements and proposed settlement forms by the parties;
- (2)(C) Obtain child custody evaluations from the Division of Family Services or through the private sector;
- (2)(D) Make recommendations to the court regarding any issue, including a recommendation for entry of final judgment;
- (2)(E) Require counsel to file with the initial or responsive pleading, a certificate based upon the facts available at that time, stating whether there is a legal action pending or previously adjudicated in a district or juvenile court of any state regarding the minor child(ren) in the current case;
- (2)(F) Impose sanctions against any party who fails to comply with the commissioner's requirements of attendance or production of discovery;



Re: Rules for final action

The comment period for the following rules has closed, and the Policy and Planning Committee recommends that they be approved.

Rule summary

CJA 02-0206. Effective date of rules. Amend. Designates May 1 and November 1 as the presumed effective date of Judicial Council rules.

CJA 04-0610. Appointment of justice court judges to preside at first appearances, preliminary hearings and arraignments. Amend. Technical amendment.

CJA 07-0304. Probation supervision. Amend. As published for comment the amendments would have changed the time for filing and reviewing supervision plans. The amendments would have included the Balanced and Restorative Justice Model throughout the case planning process.

Comments

There were no comments, but the committee endorses the recommendation of the Board of Juvenile Court Judges to delete paragraph (4). The provisions of paragraph (4) affect the day-to-day training and management of probation supervisors, which need more flexibility than is permitted by a rule. These items will be incorporated into probation training and reference manuals.

 - (1) Definition. Probation means the legal status created by court order following an adjudication on the ground of a violation of law where a minor is permitted to remain at home or in a foster home under prescribed conditions and under the supervision of the probation department, or other agencies or individuals designated by the court.
 - (2) Assignment of probation officer. When the court has placed a minor on probation, a probation officer shall be assigned to supervise the minor.
 - (3) Probation guidelines.
 - (3)(A) Probation should be limited to minors who are identified as medium to high risk to the community because of the frequency or severity of the offenses for which they have been adjudicated.
 - (3)(B) Probation should begin with an intensive orientation by a probation officer and assignment to a probation level based on the results of a risk assessment. Probation should not extend longer than six months, except when special circumstances are present.
 - (3)(C) Probation status should not be continued solely for the reason of monitoring payment of fines and restitution for a minor who otherwise has complied with the conditions of probation.
 - (3)(D) Probation should not be used for a youth referred only for status offenses or minor infractions. Other dispositional alternatives should be considered for this type of case such as a fine, compensatory service, delayed disposition or continuing jurisdiction, without requiring the intervention and supervision of the probation department.



Re: Rule 1-206. Criteria for leadership positions.

The Policy and Planning Committee was unable to reach a recommendation regarding this rule and so presents it for the Judicial Council's consideration. The draft has been circulated within the judiciary, but it has not been published for comment.

The topic was first raised during the planning workshop in Moab in October, 2012 and assigned to the Policy and Planning Committee. First the committee developed the concept of a minimum number of years as a judge before serving in leadership positions. Although never reduced to a rule, the concept was circulated to the boards of judges and the presiding judges. As a result of their input, the approach was changed to describe the qualities that judges should look for in the leaders they select.

After further discussions, the Board of District Court Judges recommends against any rule. The Board of Juvenile Court Judges and the Board of Justice Court Judges support the rule.

Informal Opinion 12-02 December 28, 2012

Question:

The Judicial Conduct Commission has requested an opinion on whether a judge may refer criminal defendants to a specific service provider when the provider is on a preapproved roster created by the court and the referrals are made on a rotating basis.

Answer:

Yes, as long as the criteria the court creates for being admitted to the roster are reasonable and directly related to the services that the court needs and any interested individual or entity may apply to be included on the roster. The judge should not make referrals from the roster. The roster should be provided to the defendants and they should select their preferred provider.

Discussion:

The Judicial Conduct Commission (JCC) has requested an ethics advisory opinion on the propriety of a judge referring defendants to a specific service provider. The JCC states that the request arises from a concern "that a justice court's on-going referral program . . . may violate [the] Code of Judicial Conduct." The JCC provided the following background:

[T]he judge preapproves a pool of providers and then makes referrals among those providers on a rotating basis. Any state licensed provider may apply to be admitted to the pool by complying with the provisions of the [court's] administrative orders. There is no evidence that the judge or the court benefits financially from the arrangement or that admission to the pool is based on anything other than state licensure and a willingness to adhere to the principles and requirements set forth in administrative orders.

The JCC also provided information from the justice court showing the criteria and process for inclusion on the roster.

In making its request, the JCC referenced Informal Opinion 10-2 in which this Committee determined that a judge may not refer parties to a specific mediator. The Committee determined that referring parties to a specific mediator would create the impression that the mediator is in a

special position to influence the judge. The Committee also determined that referring to a specific mediator would be using the prestige of the judicial office to advance the personal and economic interests of the mediator. The Committee did not address the question of whether a judge could give parties a list of mediators and allow the parties to select from the list. However, the Committee stated that a judge could refer individuals to the roster of mediators maintained by the Administrative Office of the Courts.

According to the facts provided by the JCC, referrals in the justice court are made from a roster of court approved licensed providers. The court has established criteria for being listed on the roster. Any licensed provider may apply to be on the roster, as long as the provider is willing to make the commitments required by the court. Under the criteria, providers are required to have a representative present in the courtroom when referrals are made. The court will then make referrals from the list on a rotating basis, but a referral may also include consideration of a provider's proximity to a defendant's domicile or work. Thus, although referral will generally be on a rotating basis, some deviation may occur when the court deems it appropriate.

The Committee determines that a judge may create a roster from which referrals will be made provided the creation of the roster is based on unbiased considerations. The criteria for being included on the roster must be reasonable and directly related to the needs of the court. For example, if licensure is required to provide the services, either because a law specifically requires a licensed program, or the court determines that only licensed providers are capable of providing the necessary services, then licensure is a reasonable criterion. Requiring a provider to offer specific services is also a reasonable criterion. By creating a list that is open to those who are interested the court will eliminate any perception that the providers are in a special position to influence the judge. Also, the judge will not be using the prestige of the judicial office to advance the interests of others, as all interested and qualified providers will be on the list and have the same opportunities. Although the providers will benefit financially from being included on the list, by allowing all interested providers to apply for inclusion the prestige of the judicial office is not a factor. The judge will not be favoring one provider over another.

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When establishing a roster, the judge may not establish any criterion that reflects bias toward a specific provider or a specific type of provider. In the circumstances of this particular request, one of the criterion that the Committee questions is the requirement that the provider have a representative present in the courtroom as a condition for inclusion on the roster. On its face, it is not clear why presence in the courtroom would be necessary when, under most circumstances, it is not necessary for a provider to be present in court in order for effective services to be administered. There may be reasonable justifications for this requirement that are not immediately apparent to the Committee, and therefore the Committee is not determining that this particular requirement is inappropriate. The Committee simply notes that courts must carefully evaluate their criteria to ensure that capable and willing providers are not unreasonably excluded.

As for making referrals, a majority of the Committee determines that judges should not make referrals, even if the referrals are made on a rotating basis. Judges should provide a copy of the roster to defendants and the defendants should select the provider. By having the defendants select their preferred provider, judges will be removed from any perception that judges have biases towards providers on the roster. The courts' role is to allow qualified and acceptable providers to be available to defendants. Having fulfilled that role, there is no reason for the court to be involved in the referral process.

In conclusion, courts may create rosters of service providers as long as all interested individuals and entities have an opportunity to apply for inclusion, and provided the criteria for being included are reasonable and unbiased. The court must allow defendants to select from the roster. Under these circumstances, the court would not be lending the prestige of the judicial office, and providers will not be receiving economic benefits to the exclusion of others.

The Committee recognizes that the conclusions of this opinion will raise questions about court referrals in other areas, such as specialty courts. The Committee is unable to anticipate how this opinion will affect those areas because the questions will be fact specific as to how a provider is selected and being used. The Committee must therefore await opinion requests dealing with other situations before offering advice.

¹ One Committee member is of the opinion that a judge may make referrals provided the referrals are done entirely on a rotating basis. The judge would not be able to consider proximity or other factors that would deviate from rotation.

At its February 2013 meeting the Board of District Court Judges heard a report from the AOC's general counsel Brent Johnson regarding the significant amount of feedback that has been received related to the Ethics Committee's Informal Opinion 12-02 dated December 28, 2012 (the "Opinion"). The Board was informed that the Judicial Council has specifically requested input from the Board related to the Opinion for consideration at the Council's May 2013 meeting. Initially, the Board tasked its Chairman, Scott Hadley, together with Brent West, as presiding judge of the Second District, to make contact with the presiding judges of all districts and to otherwise collect comments from the district court bench.

In passing along these observations, the Board does not intend to be, and does not wish to appear to be, critical of the work done by the Ethics Committee. The Board recognizes and appreciates the work that the Committee performs, and the judges who have made comments have also expressed their sincere appreciation for the work done by the Committee.

Outlined below are some of the issues that have been raised by district court judges concerning the Opinion as it relates to the selection of service providers. They are not listed in any particular order of preference or depth of concern. They are intended only to reflect insight into how the Opinion may affect the practical realities of the sentencing and oversight process. The comments have been garnered from multiple sources, but the Board has had neither the time nor the resources to do any scientific surveying or empirical analysis.

Does the phrase "service provider" as used in the Opinion refer only to providers 1. of actual services, such as mental health treatment, drug or alcohol treatment, etc., or does it include private probation supervisors who do not provide treatment, but only supervise probation? The number of private probation supervisors is increasing. In rural areas, and even in highly populated areas, district court judges are required to handle significant misdemeanor calendars. By statute, the State's Department of Adult Probation and Parole (hereinafter "AP&P") can decline supervising probation on class B and C misdemeanors. In addition, AP&P is increasingly recommending the appointment of private probation supervisors on class A misdemeanors. Many judges believe that rotating evenly among these private probation supervisors should not create an ethical problem. Each probation supervisor can work with the defendant in locating and completing an appropriate court ordered service program. The judge in no way lends credence to any one probation supervisor and the defendant and private probation supervisor select the service provider. This is analogous to the AP&P model currently used in the district courts when AP&P is assigned to supervise felony defendants.

- We recognize the need for the Ethics Committee to address judicial behavior as it relates to the code of ethics, but many judges have expressed concern over the committee's apparent position that the right to choose a provider belongs entirely to the defendant. Full implementation of that concept, as a practical matter, may create several major problems and considerable delay in the sentencing and oversight process. For example, typically a class B or C misdemeanor defendant is placed on informal court probation rather than assigned to AP&P (which would decline the assignment) or to a private probation supervisor (whose fees would add tremendously to the financial burden on the defendant). From experience it seems clear that requiring the defendant to meet immediately with a representative of a service provider who is present in the courtroom significantly increases the likelihood that (i) the services will actually be provided in a timely fashion and (ii) any failure of the defendant to complete the program will be brought to the attention of the Court. Otherwise, the Court would be required to schedule multiple reviews during the course of the probation period to determine if the defendant actually found a provider and completed the required program. Adding those reviews to already over-crowded misdemeanor dockets would be very burdensome to the Court and to the defendants.
- 3. In addition to the above, there are concerns that defendants will gravitate to the cheapest and easiest programs. This seems to be contrary to the goal of utilizing the best and most effective probation services and programs. Recently, the Judiciary has spent several years talking about the importance of utilizing only "evidenced-based programs". Many of us agreed that was the direction we should be heading. This opinion appears to provide a way to step backwards.
- 4. Not all service providers are created equal. While they are all required to be state approved and provide multiple services, many specialize. Some offer a better alcohol education class than others. Some emphasize inpatient treatment, others outpatient treatment. Some have better language counselors than others. It seems that a judge should be able to direct the defendant to use the programs or services best suited to the defendant's specialized needs. It is unclear how this can be accomplished within the constraints outlined in the Opinion.
- 5. If a judge cannot select a specific program as a condition of probation and defers the selection to the defendant, does the judge have the right to decline a program that the defendant then selects? For example, a defendant may claim that he or she can only afford an anger management class, but it is apparent to the judge that the defendant needs a full fledged domestic violence program. Can the judge say no? If the judge can decline the program selected by the defendant, significant delays will be introduced into the process to allow the defendant to present proposed programs for consideration by the judge. Also, how is that better than directing the defendant to the appropriate program in the first place?
- 6. Rural judges have expressed concern that there are not very many service providers in their areas. What does the committee recommend if there is only one service provider?

7. Many judges who contacted us have indicated that they agree with the minority position expressed in the opinion that would allow a strict controlled rotation of providers. They feel that potential ethical issues are adequately addressed by requiring a rotation.

Thank you for allowing us to express these concerns to the Council.

Topic Review of 2013 Legislative Changes By Debra Moore & Lisa Crenshaw

Discussion: The Committee reviewed legislation enacted during the 2013 session relating to criminal offenses. By unanimous vote, based on motions made and seconded, the Committee made the recommendations set forth in the document "Review of New Legislation – Bills" with changes as discussed. Discussion occurred regarding the following:

Change all \$583 amounts to \$570. Judge Connors gave a brief historical review of how this number got into the system by reverse calculation. He suggested that all of the \$583 amounts added to the Bail Schedule be rounded to \$570. The Committee agreed to this change.

HB 31 Enticing a Minor Amendments. The Committee determined to break out this line into separate lines for the Class B and C Misdemeanors according to the statute.

HB 102 Arson Penalty Amendments. The Committee determined to break out this line into separate lines for the Class B and C Misdemeanors according to the statute.

How do we not send in the report on an out-of-state driver who receives a PIA?



Initiative on Utah Children in Foster Care Highlights and Accomplishments

Background

In 2005, the Utah State Courts launched the Initiative on Utah Children in Foster Care (IOU) in response to a report by the Pew Commission on Children in Foster Care. The result was a collaborative effort between child protection agencies, business leaders, religious groups and public officials to improve the lives of youth in foster care. Christine Durham, then-Chief Justice of the Utah Supreme Court, spearheaded IOU in cooperation with Utah Governor Olene Walker, to bring attention to key issues in child protection. "We saw a need, beyond what government agencies could do, to rally as a community around these young people," Justice Durham remembers. She and other leaders set an ambitious agenda to improve the amount and quality of community involvement in the well-being of children. With this focus, IOU implemented innovative solutions and system change occurred on many fronts.

"IOU as an acronym worked so well because it meant we were focused on what we owed to these children and families. The notion was we owed these children better outcomes - a pretty tall order."

It is unusual to have such an initiative led from the Utah Supreme Court, in conjunction with Juvenile Court, but it illustrates the vast impact of children's issues on the legal system as a whole. Leadership from all court levels has sustained IOU in its ongoing effort for more than seven years.

The PEW Report

Utah leaders were inspired when The Pew Charitable Trusts created and funded the Pew Commission on Children in Foster Care. The Commission released a provocative study in 2004 entitled "Fostering the Future: Safety, Permanence and Well-Being for Children in Foster Care." Utah Court of Appeals Judge William A. Thorne had the distinction of serving on the National Pew Commission. "It was ground breaking because the Pew Commission report provided specific action steps that each state could take to change the futures for these children," Judge Thorne notes. The Pew report suggested that courts should take a leadership role in child protection on four fronts:

- 1. Increasing court accountability in child abuse and neglect cases;
- Promoting coalitions between child serving systems and the courts;
- Strengthening judicial leadership to bring about improved court performance in child abuse and neglect cases;
- 4. Ensuring that children and their parents have a direct voice in court, effective legal representation, and the timely input of those who care about them.

When reading the Pew recommendations in 2005, Utah's Supreme Court Chief Justice Christine Durham was galvanized into action. "It was our chance to go out on a limb for these children and IOU was born," she states.

During the 1990s, Utah faced some of the same challenges as the rest of the country with social workers carrying large caseloads and child protection programs struggling with reduced funding. Children were falling through the cracks of this overwhelmed and underappreciated system, resulting in abuse or neglect by family members and even harm while children were in foster care. These tragedies caught the attention of national child advocates and demands for change rang out.

David C. REFORM LAWSUIT

In 1993, the National Center for Youth Law filed *David C. v. Leavitt*, a class action lawsuit alleging a comprehensive failure of Utah's child protection system. As a result, Utah leaders began to improve the care given to youth in foster care and negotiated a robust settlement agreement mandating greater funding for DCFS caseworkers. Important reforms such as citizen oversight and timelines for permanency were put in place. Utah's measures of performance moved steadily forward

in the early years. "We adopted a new Practice Model for child protective services (CPS)," explains Betournay, "and that added a great deal of professionalism and accountability to our system." Overall, Utah also benefitted from its unique centralized judicial system, where juvenile court judges are dedicated solely to children's issues. The state follows the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges' "one family, one judge" model to keep connections open with the families being served. As Justice Durham remembers, "Our stakeholders began to focus on Utah's children in a new way, and the David C. lawsuit created an environment that made everyone highly motivated."


Where Utah is Headed

Due to the commitment shown by IOU and allied efforts by the entire Utah child protection community, outcomes for youth improved. The David C. lawsuit was finally dismissed in the summer of 2007. Child advocates praised the work of the Utah leaders in turning the system around. The National Center for Youth Law Director Leecia Welch noted on the center's website: "After 14 long years, Utah now has one of the best child welfare systems in the country. Children are safer, and they have a better chance of reaching their full potential."

The state's exit from the massive class action lawsuit was the first of its kind nationally, made possible by key leadership from then Utah Governor Jon M. Huntsman, legislators, IOU,

the juvenile courts, DCFS and allied agencies. Utah's Department of Human Services Executive Director Lisa-Michele Church shepherded the exit by rallying impassioned people to take up the cause of child protection.

"Utahns from all walks of life stepped in to help improve foster care," Church says. "The YWCA helped, the courts pitched in, advocacy groups like Voices for Utah Children came to the table, and everyone did what they could. DCFS caseworkers felt support from legislators who recognized the difficulty of their jobs. Foster parents knew they were valued by the community at large." IOU and the Utah Court system continue to be the vanguard of efforts to maintain the progress of the last decade.

Subcommittees

IOU's broad vision is to bring non-traditional groups together around issues that affect the whole community – the care of abused and neglected children. "We couldn't just look at the immediate need of a child after abuse; we had to also look at the long-term chances we were going to give these children," says Duane Betournay, then head of Utah's Division of Child and Family Services (DCFS). "It was immensely powerful to have bankers, nurses, pastors, teachers, and people from all walks of life joining with our government agencies in this effort."

IOU's subcommittees focus on supporting relatives who are caregivers, improving educational outcomes, increasing public awareness of child protection issues, and helping teenaged youth transition successfully into adulthood. Synergies between state agencies and community leaders are resulting in a more proactive environment to solve the tough problems facing the youth.

IOU relies on some limited funding from the federal Children's Bureau Court Improvement Program grant, but the majority of its effort is donated and volunteer in nature. "IOU isn't so much about creating and funding new services," observes Justice Durham, "it's about bringing the right people together into a room to use existing resources in new ways."

Highlights and Accomplishments

Kinship Care Subcommittee

Beyond the 2,500 Utah children in actual foster care, Utah Census data reflects an even larger shadow population of 83,000 youth living informally with relatives due to absent parents. Despite their passionate efforts to care for their relatives, kin sometimes lack the resources to care for the child's special needs. IOU's Kinship Subcommittee, under the leadership of LDS Church official Merrill Bateman, was created to address these concerns.

"One of the major concerns that anyone knowledgeable of kinship care had in the beginning was the lack of training for the kinship caregivers; there was almost nothing out there."

The Kinship Subcommittee quickly understood how strained the established support systems were in delivering services and information to kinship care givers. Far too often kinship families were being denied financial support due to bureaucratic barriers. The IOU Kinship Subcommittee successfully focused on making these systems easier for kin to navigate.

Kin needed better information on how to get help. One approach was to expand Utah's existing Grandfamilies program. Grandfamilies brings relatives caring for children together and supports them on many fronts. Utah's century old non-profit, Children's Service Society has managed the Grandfamilies program since 2002. Due to IOU's efforts, Grandfamilies increased attendance in its supportive educational classes. The subcommittee also helped establish a one-stop information website hosted by the Children's Service Society. When the subcommittee was originally formed, the existing Grandfamilies Program served only residents of Salt Lake County; with IOU support, Grandfamilies expanded its existing Salt Lake County services into Utah County, Tooele County, and Davis County.



"We discovered kinship care runs across all economic backgrounds in Utah. It's impossible to stereotype the situation or person. We saw an opportunity to go beyond the small foster care population and to reach the population of relatives informally caring for kids too."

The Kinship Subcommittee illustrates the efforts made of bringing community partners to the table. The subcommittee built upon the highly successful support structures already located in Utah's faith community.

Former State Chief Justice Christine Durham notes, "We invited providers of services in the nonprofit children services and religious groups. We knew they had networks. They were where the rubber meets the road. We went straight to the religious leaders. Elder Bateman really took this project on and brought an unprecedented level of visibility to foster care issues." IOU was able to support kin caregivers by encouraging well established religious community networks with additional funding and resources to strengthen kinship efforts.

Kinship Care Subcommittee Accomplishments

- Created a Grandfamilies program website hosted by the Children's Service Society to provide information and support for caregivers.
- Supported the Third Judicial District Kinship Summit. The summit was attended by 300 participants representing the Division of Child and Family Services, the Juvenile Court, and the Office of Licensing.
- Expanded Grandfamilies program beyond Salt Lake County, into Utah County, Tooele County, and Davis County.
- Initiated the statewide Grandfamilies Awareness Week.
- Facilitated streamlining DCFS referrals to Utah's Department of Workforce
 Services getting people where they needed to go faster for guardianship supports.
- Secured financial support exceeding \$25,000 for the creation of fliers distributed throughout religious organizations.

Youth in foster care have lower GPAs, lower test scores, and experience decreased permanency due to increased school mobility. Frequently changing schools erodes a child's ability to succeed educationally. The challenges faced by foster youth deny them opportunities equal to their peers who are not in foster care. These challenges include the psychological trauma of leaving familiar surroundings, enrollment issues caused by complex administrative regulations, starting over in new schools, changing schools before completing credits, and difficulty transferring earned credits.

IOU heard directly from youth in foster care that they were not getting the same chances at school. After hearing their voice, the IOU Committee formed the IOU Education Workgroup chaired by then Juvenile Court Administrator Ray Wahl. The Education Workgroup learned that when school transfers did occur, class credits earned by youth in foster care were not always transferred.

The Education Workgroup has been instrumental in the effort to reduce barriers to education. They helped negotiate a new enrollment protocol between Salt Lake Valley Region DCFS

and the Jordan School District to admit youth seamlessly. IOU now hopes districts statewide will streamline their enrollment processes in order for these youth to move forward successfully with their education.

A 2012 collective agreement between the Utah State Office of Education and the Department of Human Services resulted in a statewide data match, showing specifically that youth in state care were behind their peers in school success. Assistant Juvenile Court Administrator Katie Gregory poignantly notes, "Before IOU, education of children in care was a fuzzy area. We had lots of questions, but no data."

"The data presents a depressing picture, but it gives us a baseline to measure progress. It provides room for optimism in moving forward because at least we are beginning to have a measurable idea of where we are with these youth. With this data, we can focus on specific issues and make targeted improvements"

Youth in foster care need different things from Utah's schools, and educators are up to the task.

Communication has already improved between caseworkers and teachers because the Education Workgroup remains focused on youth's educational outcomes. IOU concentrates on education improvement by fostering collaborations between these agencies, including those who serve tribal communities.

The courts really are critical to holding the whole system accountable."

The judges now have the tools to track a child's school progress and ask tough questions of the guardian ad litem, caseworker, parents, and service providers. Ray Wahl notes, "I have really enjoyed the work of bringing schools and courts together. It reminds me that everyone has good intentions about wanting to get good outcomes for kids." However, Wahl also explains that despite the gains, "to declare victory, that we have solved all the education problems for foster care kids, will not help these kids. We cannot take our eye off the ball with these kids. We must continue to advocate passionately for their success."



Education Workgroup Accomplishments

- Launched the *Educating Youth in State Care* website in May 2009 as a collaborative education resource and found at http://www.hs.utah.gov/education. The website provides a wealth of information for the public on education for youth in foster care and youth involved in the juvenile justice system.
- Led a training session introducing 870 education, court, and human services workers to the *Educating Youth in State Care* website.
- Created the first State Education Liaison position.
- Designated education liaisons in each DCFS region.
- Updated SAFE (the DCFS child welfare database) screens with education information for each child in DCFS custody.
- Helped broker an initial data exchange between the Department of Human Services and the Utah State Office of Education as the first step toward information sharing.
- Hosted an Education Summit with the Fourth District Juvenile Court where 260 participants received information on local, state, and national education efforts.
 Participants provided their professional feedback on how to improve education for court-involved youth.
- Provided education immersions between partners involved in the education of children in foster care about the role each agency plays.
- Former Chief Justice Christine Durham met with state school superintendents requesting their support and greater attention to the needs of foster youth in schools.
- In a collaborative effort, received a federal grant to recruit and train Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) in education advocacy.

CASAs as Education Advocates

Recognizing that youth in state care need someone to advocate for their education needs, IOU leaders came up with an innovative way to expand the resources of the Office of Guardian ad Litem. Leaders determined that Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) could be trained to monitor a child's school progress and report to the court.

"Caseloads are just too high for everyone. Our Guardian ad Litem attorneys represent an average of 150-200 children a year. That breaks down to approximately 10 hours a year per case with 8-9 of those hours spent in court. There simply isn't enough time for any case party to look into all aspects of a child's life. CASAs have more time than any other case party, resulting in identifying any potential red flags. Education has become a primary focus for the Utah CASA Program."

IOU helped the CASA effort by using the Collaboration to Increase Education Stability Grant to recruit and train 300 additional CASAs to act as education advocates. The IOU Education Workgroup and the CASA program are excited to continue training quality CASA volunteers who will advocate for the youth's educational needs throughout the legal process.

CASA Education Workgroup Accomplishments

- Helped secure grant funding to recruit an additional 300 CASAs specifically for education advocacy in the court system.
- Hosted the Endless Dreams Summit in January of 2013 to train 300 educators and CASAs on unique child protection issues.
- Negotiated Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) barriers to allow schools to exchange information with CASAs.
- · Trained judges on how to best use CASAs in the courtroom.



IOU Education Workgroup in Action

Public Awareness Subcommittee

The IOU Public Awareness Subcommittee recognized the importance of keeping community leaders and members knowledgeable about child protection issues. Child protection is often unsung and unappreciated by the public at large. But if left unsupported, it will be constantly under attack and weakened. Utahns needed a better understanding of the inner workings of child protection investigations. DCFS created an "immersion day" where citizens could trace a child's experience in the child protection system firsthand - all in one day. Attendees gain an understanding of the complex and often difficult decisions made by DCFS and Juvenile Court staff.


"The charm of the committee is it's not just the internal players and likely suspects who serve. It brings in business leaders, religious groups, and outside community groups. To have someone like the president of Zions Bank or a recognized leader of the LDS Church go and talk to the Salt Lake Tribune about foster care needs is very different than having an internal advocate. Policy makers hear from traditional stakeholders all the time. But they don't hear from business and community leaders all the time."

The Public Awareness Subcommittee has focused on winning the support of the community and its leaders. Duane Betournay noted, "If you don't have the broad support of the community and unless there is broad recognition of the good work of the agency, the work will fail. That is where IOU provides real benefit. IOU keeps people focused on quality and communication." Groups regularly observe court and leave feeling a little overwhelmed but praising the difficult work done there.

Public Awareness Subcommittee Accomplishments

- Supported DCFS's "immersion day" regularly held to educate the public on foster youth's transition through state agencies.
- Teamed with the Desert News in donating \$100,000 in free advertising to share "Stories of Hope" of children and families' successful experience with the child protection system.
- Established the Child and Family Services Cabinet Council by Governor Huntsman to ensure that the needs of children were prioritized in all state funding allocations.
- Created Workshops for kin on the effects of methamphetamine use on a person's thinking, the type of child neglect related to parental drug use, and the ways kin could help children in foster care.
- Supported a "Drug Endangered Children Conference" where a group of children presented on their experiences with their substance abusing mothers and how DCFS assisted.
- Held an immersion in Spanish for Latino community leaders.
- Held immersions tailored to schools or other special interests.



Highlights and Accomplishments

Health Care

IOU members heard concerns about health issues from youth in foster care. Teens were worried about being able to go to the doctor after they left foster care. This caused extreme anxiety for the youth and led the Commission to work with a Utah legislator to advance a bill to extend Medicaid coverage to age 21 for youth with the greatest need.

Former Utah Supreme Court Chief Justice Christine Durham has been an advocate for youth's health care since the beginning of the Committee. Justice Durham remains passionate on the issue. "One of the issues we continue to worry about is health care. It is still very spotty. The system is failing kids in making services available. Youth in foster care tend not to hook into these services within the system. They lack what is needed to get medical care, including mental health services."

Health Care Accomplishments

- Formulated and promoted the passage of H.B. 228 Medical Recommendations for Foster Children with Representative David Hogue in 2006, the bill extending Medicaid coverage from age 18 to age 21 for youth in protective services.
- Advanced foster youth's health care issues by bringing community pediatricians into the committee, who raised awareness of these issues with their physician colleagues.

Highlights and Accomplishments



Children's Mental Health

Many of the children in Utah's foster care system face an additional challenge due to mental health issues, ranging from depression to severe emotional disturbances. IOU was privileged to hear from several of these youth during the March 2011 IOU meeting. The teens described feeling alone and misunderstood due to their unique needs. All of them had spent time in residential mental health treatment programs in Utah and they told IOU members about what worked and didn't work well in these services.

IOU sought more information on foster youth and mental health from local experts such as Lana Stohl, Director of Utah's Division of Substance Abuse and Mental Health, Cosette Mills, Division of Child and Family Services, Lori Cerar, Allies for Families, and Carol Anderson, from the Utah State Office of Education. Stohl presented information illustrating the importance of early intervention for children with mental illness, to avoid more intensive services later. Mills outlined for the group the recent changes in Medicaid rules that required mental health treatment to occur in smaller 16-bed settings.

Cerar explained how the Family Resource Facilitators throughout the state are available to help families navigate the complex system of treatment providers, government agencies and courts.

Anderson discussed Utah statistics regarding youth suicide and noted that 63% of the students who committed suicide had a prior referral to Juvenile Court. IOU saw a need to support the many valuable initiatives already underway in Utah's mental health community.



Highlights and Accomplishments

IOU also heard a presentation from Utah Department of Health Nurse Chris Chytraus, who explained that each child in foster care is assessed for mental health issues as part of their general health care. She set forth the key challenges for these youth as 1) the need to coordinate among different services, 2) difficulty getting children into mental health facilities, 3) problems in managing the youth's medication, and 4) lack of follow up from caregivers as to medication management.

Karen Crompton, Director of Voices for Utah Children, presented to IOU on the need for Utah's Medicaid plan to provide "presumptive eligibility" for children in foster care who are returning home. Rather than losing their Medicaid coverage immediately upon leaving care, the children could be considered eligible while in transition and this would prevent disruption in their medication or services.

Children's Mental Health Accomplishments

- Supported "presumptive eligibility" for Utah's foster children leaving care, so they could retain their Medicaid coverage while in transition.
- Trained Family Resource Facilitators in July, 2011 on Juvenile Court practice and how to best partner with Juvenile Court when serving Utah's children with mental health issues.
- Trained Judges on Family Resource Facilitators and how to use them as part of the team built around a child who is involved with Juvenile Court.
- Included sessions at the Juvenile Judges' 2011 Conference on Trauma-Informed Care and Youth Suicide and a session at Judges' Annual 2011 Conference on court-involved individuals with mental health issues.
- Worked with the Foster Care Foundation to improve foster parents' access to mental health resources, particularly around medication management.



Transition to Adult Living Subcommittee

Children who "age out" of foster care when they turn 18 without being adopted have unique and challenging needs. Losing support structures from the state can present them with insurmountable obstacles. These young adults can lack the typical resiliency found in a traditional family. Youth may need job training, have low or no income, and may have no place to live. Former Utah Governor Olene Walker stated, "I felt we could do far better. I'm very pleased that the private sectors, the agencies, the public sectors, and everyone jumped in to make a difference in helping these kids."

With the support of the TAL Subcommittee, the Utah Legislature passed H.B. 122 Driver License – Application of Minor Amendments (Rep. David Litvack, 2008). This provided, with legal guardian/care giver consent, a more equitable and responsible route for youth in foster care to access an essential mode of transportation.

IOU and the Department of Workforce Services hosted "Door Opener" luncheons with the business community. These efforts helped pair foster youth with key business leaders, benefiting the youth with possible employment connections. "A real difficulty for youth in foster care was obtaining a driver license. We learned about problems that needed solving through the statutory process. The more we worked as a group, the more optimistic people became about the situation."

IOU's partnering with community leaders has been the key factor in the committee's efforts. For example, IOU partnered with Utah's non-profit Christmas Box House International. The TAL Subcommittee originally gave Christmas Box House International \$10,000 in funds to try out their "Life Start Boxes." These kits provide youth leaving foster care with basic daily items like pots, pans, sheets, and towels. The Christmas Box House International's Life Start Boxes were so successful the group was able to expand access to surrounding states.

Highlights and Accomplishments

Transition to Adult Living Subcommittee Accomplishments

- Formulated and promoted the passage of H.B. 122 Driver License -Application for Minor Amendments with Representative David Litvack in 2008. The bill improved foster youth's ability to obtain a driver license with consenting care giver permission.
- Hosted "Door Opener" meetings with foster youth and local business leaders allowing the groups to meet each other.
- Provided access to grant funding to Utah's non-profit The Christmas Box House International to create "Life Starter Boxes." These kits provide basic supplies for youth transitioning out of protective care.

"We heard from youth in foster care that they weren't getting the same career opportunities as their peers. At Department of Workforce Services we had an opportunity to bring some of the state's best employers in and pair them up with youth in foster care. This helped both groups to see what the other one had to offer, and influenced the kids to set ambitious employment goals for themselves."


Mentoring

IOU members saw teenaged youth in foster care that needed an adult to mentor them and guide them in making good choices. While DCFS was doing an excellent job of teaching life skills, more personal attention was needed to relationships. The IOU Commission brought impassioned youth advocates from various state agencies and the community to the same table to create team building around this issue.

Dorothy Dart is one example of an individual from the community coming forward to make a difference. After hearing from the transition to adult living (TAL) youth, she was so moved she then went on to organize mentor groups through the Salt Lake's First Presbyterian Church. This group became the non-profit Utah Youth Mentor Project.

"I wanted to get involved because living in a foster home you feel that you're not really paid attention to because there are so many other kids. Having someone who is there to listen and help you is worth more than anything."

The Utah Youth Mentor Project has matched over 138 foster youth with trained mentors in a two-year commitment to provide support during transitioning from foster care to independence. These mentors are the supportive difference for these kids and can result in life-long friendships. The Utah Youth Mentor Project has also been pivotal in securing transitional housing vouchers for youth with no place to live after leaving foster care.

Youth involved in the Utah Youth Mentor Project have better outcomes when compared to their non-mentored peers. The Utah Youth Mentor Project notes that their mentored youth experience fewer incidents of arrests, homelessness, substance abuse, and pregnancy, as well as an increase college attendance rates.

Mentoring Accomplishments

- Spurred on the creation of the Utah Youth Mentor Project, a private non-profit organization which assists youth aging out of foster care with trained mentors. The Utah Youth Mentor Project has been a key advocate for housing and teaching life skills such as money management to foster youth aging out of state care.
- Provided access to Court Improvement Program funding to the Utah Youth Mentor Project. This funding assisted in the creation of a financial decision game to help inspire critical thinking on tough life decisions. The financial decision game is made available to any interested group.
- Raised the issue of the importance of mentors being available to youth in protective care and after aging out of the system.

"We wouldn't be an organization without the community support and IOU support. When Katie Gregory from Juvenile Court writes a letter of support it carries a lot of weight. The legitimacy that IOU gives our program is what makes it work. Through bridge building we got to work with agencies and received credence."

Future Challenges

Utah's child protection community has made progress, benefitting from the progressive efforts of state agencies and community partners. The Court used its unique position of authority to advocate for youth in foster care and the families involved. However, child protection agencies and community partners remain concerned about several challenges still facing foster youth.

"In the future we must ask ourselves if we have the passion and desire to make a difference with youth in foster care that don't have someone advocating for their very fundamental needs. Count me in on this challenge."


- Recent analysis of at-risk children indicates the measure of "economic well-being" has drastically decreased since the Great Recession. The erosion of these hard-fought gains is concerning for youth advocates and it remains unclear if this will have future spillover effects that might increase the need for child protection.
- Utah agencies and the public must remain focused on improving youth's education outcomes. Progress will come from efforts to increase GPAs and CASA education advocates and decrease mobility and administrative barriers.
- Recruiting more mentors has greatly benefited the efforts of Utah's Youth Mentor Project. Providing more community mentors to youth will continue to benefit the state and provide positive role models.
- Fluctuations in year-to-year foster care admissions should be expected. While one year may provide favorable measures of decreased foster care, this may not dictate that the following year will necessarily have similar results. Stakeholders and the state legislature must remain proactive in meeting these unexpected increased needs. The community must continue to come to grips with the critical needs of foster youth and should fund it accordingly, even while helping families become stronger.

Future Challenges

- Youth in foster care, adoptive families, and transitioning young adults require community support to succeed. Keeping the public informed of the unique plight faced by children in protective services must remain a top priority.
- Drug abuse remains a threat to Utah's children and a concern for youth protection services.
- Youth advocates are hopeful that mental health care for youth in state care will receive more legislative attention and action.
- We need more foster families, especially more with diverse cultural backgrounds, including tribal connections.
- · We need more resources for foster parents to meet children's special needs.



EDUCATION ASSISTANCE

PURPOSE

Court employees are encouraged to seek further education to perform their jobs more effectively and to enhance their professional development. The Human Resources Department may subsidize the education expenses of court employees under specified circumstances.

SCOPE

This policy is subject to availability of funds and applies to only-fulltime-career service and career service exempt employees who have been employed by the courts for a period of at least one year and have successfully completed a probationary period.

POLICY AND PROCEDURE

- 1. Program Eligibility.
 - 1.1 The education program must provide a benefit to the court system. by directly relating to the work the employee currently performs or is likely to perform in a career ladder progression or promotion. The types of majors typically considered to benefit the court system are criminal justice, business, sociology, psychology, political science, human resources, accounting/finance, computer science, communications, journalism. This list is not all inclusive.
 - 1.2 Unless otherwise approved by the director, assistance will only be granted to employees attending an accredited university or college. This assistance will be limited to those employees working on and pursuing a Master's or Bachelor's or Associate's degree or on a non-degree program such as a paralegal certification. This does not preclude obtaining credits at an accredited community college that can be used toward a Bachelor's degree.

2. Reimbursement.

2.1 Education assistance shall not-exceed be awarded from 50% to 100% of

the cost of tuition and fees and shall not exceed \$1000 5,250 in any one fiscal year unless approved in advance by the Deputy State Court Administrator. Tuition costs shall not be carried into the next fiscal year for reimbursement.

2.2 Education Assistance will be paid on a rotating basis. If an employee receives education assistance during the first half of the fiscal year (July 1 - December 31), the employee will not be eligible during the second half of the fiscal year (January 1 - June 30.)

3. Procedures.

- 3.1 Employees are encouraged to attend classes during nonworking hours. In the alternative, management may flex an employee's work schedule to allow the employee to attend classes. Only in exceptional circumstances may management grant an employee administrative leave for classes.
- 3.2 The director shall allocate education assistance twice a year. Applications for assistance for summer and fall terms will be accepted from June 1st through July 15th. Applications for assistance for winter and spring terms will be accepted from November_1st through December 15th. Unless there are sufficient funds to satisfy all applications, awarding of education assistance will be made by random drawings in July and December. Employees receiving assistance during the previous half year will not be eligible for the drawing the succeeding half year unless there are sufficient funds to satisfy the applications of all employees who did not receive assistance the previous half year.
- 3.3 To receive education assistance, an employee must applycomplete an application form and receive approval from the director prior to commencement of the class.
- 3.4 To be eligible for reimbursement, an employee must complete a contract approved by the Human Resources Department documenting

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participation in the education program and agreeing to repay any education assistance money received in the 24 months immediately preceding voluntary termination from statecourt employment.

- 3.5 To be reimbursed, an employee must complete the approved class (es) with a final gradeGPA of "€2.0" or better. If the course is only offered on a pass/fail basis, the employee must receive a passing grade.
- 3.6 The employee must submit proof of a satisfactory grade and proof of tuition payment to the Human Resources Department prior to reimbursement. It shall be the employee's responsibility to determine if the reimbursement amount is taxable income.

4. Required classes.

4.1 If management requires an employee to attend an education program or class, the courts shall pay the full cost.

SECOND LANGUAGE STIPENDS

PURPOSE

The purpose of this policy is to establish a uniform procedure for the administration of the Second Language Stipends.

SCOPE

This policy applies to all court employees.

CROSS REFERENCES

POLICY AND PROCEDURE

- 1. Minimum Qualifications.
 - 1.1. Employee must have completed New Employee Orientation prior to applying for a Second Language Stipend.
 - 1.2. Employee must demonstrate the required level of proficiency on the Oral Language Proficiency Exam.
 - 1.3. Employee receiving a stipend will be subject to recertification on a periodic basis not to exceed three years.
- 2. Application Process.
 - 2.1. All employees applying for a Second Language Stipend should follow this process.
 - 2.2. Complete the Second Language Stipend application with the appropriate information and approving signatures and send to Court Interpreter Program Coordinator.
 - 2.3. Complete and pass the Oral Proficiency Exam.
 - 2.4. Sign the Second Language Stipend Agreement and return to Court Interpreter Program Coordinator.
- 3. Availability and Removal.
 - 3.1. The Second Language Stipend is an extra benefit requested by the employee and the Trial Court Executive based on need and is not considered part of an employee's base salary.
 - 3.2. An employee's Second Language Stipend can be reassigned, reduced or removed at any time and for any reason.
 - 3.3. A request for a Second Language Stipend can be approved or denied based on the availability of funds and/or slots available.

4. Usage

- 4.1. The Trial Court Executive or designee shall approve and monitor all employee recipients of the Second Language Stipend.
- 4.2. The Second Language Stipend is subject to the following usage guidelines.
 - 4.2.1.The employee must be reasonably available and use the second language skills on a regular basis.
 - 4.2.2. The employee shall provide interpreting in a Court proceeding only as outlined in Rule 3-306(11)

5. Administration.

- 5.1. The Court Interpreter Program Coordinator is responsible for making available the appropriate forms, managing the Oral Proficiency Exam contract, and arranging for the test taking of the Oral Proficiency Exam.
- 5.2. The Human Resources Department is responsible for the electronic tracking of stipend recipients, positions, locations, and employment status (full-time or part-time).
- 5.3. The application, test, and acknowledgement form shall be kept in the official employee personnel file housed with the Human Resources Department as well as in electronic form.
- 5.4. The Second Language Stipend is dispersed in each recipients' bi-weekly paycheck, with the amount based on their employment status of full-time or part-time and pro-rated accordingly.
