AN OVERVIEW OF PRETRIAL RELEASING AND SUPERVISION MAY 2, 2019

General Description

- Started in 1974
- Merged with Alcohol Counseling and Education Center (ACEC) in 1991 to form Criminal Justice Services
- Hosted the NAPSA National Conference in 1996 and 2016 at Snowbird
- All employees pass the national certification process through NAPSA
- Adhere to NAPSA standards

Details

- 29 full time and 2 part time employees
- 14 jail screeners and 2 supervisors
- 10 case managers and 2 supervisors
- 2 District Court representatives, one in SL District and one in West Jordan District
- Pretrial also serves all the Justice Courts in Salt Lake County
- Average supervision time was 99 days in 2018

Types of Pretrial Release

- Own Recognizance
- Supervised Release (from the jail screening unit)
- Ordered to Pretrial Supervision (from judges)
- Pretrial and Bond
- Over-Crowding Releases (OCRs) are <u>NOT</u> facilitated by Pretrial Services

Release Criteria

- Low or medium PSA risk score
- Charge does not constitute a threat to public safety
- Judge's authorization for violent F3, F2 and F1
- Not under any supervision
- Has stable ties to the community
- Domestic violence charges must have a verified alternate residence
- Release Recommendation Reports
- Judge can order supervision at any time

Pretrial Supervision by Risk Level

- Clients are supervised by PSA risk score and as per the DMF for Salt Lake County
 - ROR: Monitor for new charges, court reminder call
 - PRL1: Monthly phone check in, court reminder call
 - PRL2: Weekly phone check in, monthly office meeting, court reminder call
 - PRL3: Daily phone check in, twice monthly office meeting, court reminder call
 - o PRL4: Daily phone check in, weekly office visit.
 - PRL5: Detain, otherwise maximum conditions.

Additional Supervision Conditions

- UA testing (at client's expense)
- Anger Management
- Courage to Change classes (journaling)
- Substance Abuse classes
- Ventnor Classes
- Electronic Monitoring (at client's expense)

Gender Informed Needs Assessment (GINA)

- Needs assessment
- Women who score PRL2 and above
- Determines the category of need
- Case manager develops a case plan

Communication with Courts

- Two court representatives in District Court
- Presentence and Assessment Unit at CJS completes Release Recommendation Reports as ordered
- Revocation requests sent to courts, defense and prosecuting counsel
- Stay reports
- 90 day letters sent to District Attorney's office on unfiled cases

Surrender Program

- Addresses individuals with outstanding District Court warrants
- Surrender screener assesses a person for eligibility
- Arranges court date and release order with conditions
- Coordinates with the jail for booking if necessary
- Benefits the defendant, law enforcement agencies and the jail

Statistics

- Created from our case management system monthly
- Includes:
 - Success Rate
 - Safety Rate
 - Number of FTAs, revocations for new charges and violations
 - Number of releases
 - Total number of clients
 - Average number of clients per case manager
 - Number of clients by risk score
 - Time from release to intake

Costs

- There is no supervision fee
- Clients pay for UA testing and Ankle Monitoring
- Screening cost is \$35*
- Daily supervision cost is \$5.71*
- Funded by Salt Lake County
