## (2) Community outreach.

- (A) Lawyers or paralegal practitioners who lecture in a community outreach capacity may receive Self-Study-Elective CLE credit for each hour spent lecturing to groups of 5 or more non-lawyers and non-paralegal practitioners for the purpose of educating a non-lawyer and non-paralegal practitioner audience about legal topics.
- (B) Community outreach may include, but is not limited to, a lecture made by a lawyer or paralegal practitioner about the lawyer's or paralegal practitioner's deliberation on legal subject matter as an elected or appointed member of a public policy making body that is created by statute or constitution and a lecture by a lawyer or a paralegal practitioner about the structure of Government, the Utah Constitution, the U.S. Constitution or any legislation of either the Utah Legislature or U.S. Congress. Such community outreach lecturing, however, must be referenced in an agenda or outline format identifying: the body to whom the lecture is presented; the date, hour, and duration of the lecture; and the topics covered.
  - (C) Community outreach lecturing on legal subjects by a lawyer is eligible for a maximum of four hours of Accredited Self Study Elective CLE credit for a Compliance Cycle. Community outreach lecturing on legal subjects by a

27	paralegal practitioner is eligible for a maximum of two hours of Accredited Self-
28	Study Elective CLE credit for a Compliance Cycle.
29	(b) Final published brochure, outline, or agenda. The Board will determine the
30	number of Self-Study Elective CLE hours available for a program based on the final
31	published brochure, outline, or agenda, as appropriate.
32	(c) Equivalent CLE credit for certain Self-Study Elective CLE.
33	(1) Subject to the Board's determination, the Board may allow equivalent credit for
34	such CLE that furthers the purpose of this article and qualifies for equivalency.
35	(2) Such equivalent CLE may include, but is not limited to, viewing Accredited CLE
36	audio and video and webcast presentations, or computer interactive telephonic
37	programs, writing and publishing an article in a legal periodical, part-time teaching
38	by a lawyer or paralegal practitioner in an approved law school, or delivering a
39	paper or speech on a professional subject at a meeting primarily attended by
40	lawyers, paralegal practitioners, legal assistants, or law students.
41	(3) The number of hours of credit allowed for such activities and the procedures for
42	obtaining equivalent credit will be determined specifically by the Board for each
43	instance.
44	(d) <b>Pro Bono Legal Services.</b> Elective CLE credit for Pro Bono Legal Services is
45	addressed in Rule 14-419.

47	An example of community outreach that would qualify for Self-Study Elective CLE
48	credit under subsection (a)(2) is a presentation made by a Legislator to a group of non-
49	lawyers and non-paralegal practitioners about the Legislator's service on a public policy
